# STATION WMFO LICENSE **RENEWAL** APPLICATION DETERMINATION OF COMPLIANCE **WITH** RFR EXPOSURE GUIDELINES AND RESPONSE TO QUESTION SIX

### I. Introduction

This exhibit was prepared by Michael **LeClair**, Engineering Consultant, on behalf of station WMFO as supplemental information regarding Question Six on the WMFO license renewal application. Specific information regarding RFR measurements is taken from a previously conducted engineering study that **was** completed in July of **1991**. As the transmission facilities of station WMFO have not changed in any way since that date, the previously measured data was re-examined to determine compliance with the Maximum Permissible Exposure Limits for both **Occupational/Controlled** exposure and General **Population/Uncontrolled** exposure as detailed in OET Bulletin 65, Edition 97-01 (Evaluating Compliance with FCC Guidelines for Human Exposure to **Radiofrequency** Electromagnetic Fields). Additionally, the General Environmental Worksheet included in Appendix C of the **license** renewal booklet was used to evaluate other environmental requirements of 47 **CFR 1.1307**.

### II. WMFO Antenna Site

The WMFO antenna, located in Medford, Massachusetts, is a directional FM radiator (corner reflector type) comprised of two independently driven elements mounted on a 12-meter tall steel triangular tower on the rooftop of Ballou Hall. The center of radiation height is 8 meters above the rooftop level. The transmitter, transmission line, and rooftop tower are all located in areas that are locked and not accessible to the public. Signs indicating a potential RFR hazard are posted at the entrance to the rooftop area.

### III. Methodology

The 1991 Engineering Study made two sets of measurements to completely characterize the RFR conditions at this site. The first set of measurements was made in public areas, such as the grounds around Ballou Hall and the hallway/office areas adjacent to the transmitter. These measurements were analyzed for compliance using the more restrictive standard for General Population/Uncontrolled exposure.

The second set of measurements was made in the direct vicinity of the **WMFO** tower structure on the Ballou Hall rooftop. These measurements were analyzed under the less restrictive standard for Occupational **Exposure/Controlled** exposure limits. Areas that constituted a hazard for RFR were clearly identified.

The WMFO transmitter was operating at h11 power during all of these tests.

# IV. Summary of Results

The new analysis of the WMFO transmission site found that it was in compliance for the Maximum Permissible Exposure Limits for General **Population/Uncontrolled** exposure in all areas below the Ballou Hall **rooftop**, which are publicly accessible.

Additionally, the analysis showed that the limits for **Occupational/Controlled** exposure were not exceeded outside a distance of approximately 2 meters **from** the **WMFO** antenna, which requires climbing the **WMFO** tower.

A copy of this Engineering Study is on file at the licensee of WMFO and is available on request. Included in the Study is the written operational plan for limiting exposure to workers requiring access to the tower for necessary maintenance. The plan describes the appropriate procedures required to avoid exceeding the FCC Guidelines for Occupational Exposure as detailed in OET Bulletin 65, Edition **97-01**. No changes to these procedures are required under the new standards.

Based on the above results, WMFO is in compliance with the applicable FCC Guidelines for radio **frequency** exposure for both the **General** Population and Occupational standards.

Furthermore, under **careful** examination of the Commission's environmental requirements in **47 CFR** Section **1.1307** as outlined in Appendix C to the License Renewal Booklet, it is apparent that the operation of station **WMFO** will not have a significant **environmental** impact as defined by Section **1.1307**.

Accordingly, the answer to Question Six is found to be "No."

I certify that the above information was prepared by me and that I **fully** understand the contents of FCC bulletin OET 65 which was used to evaluate the RFR measurement data **from** the **1991** Study.

# PETITION FOR RECONSIDERATION

Tufts University ("Tufts"), the licensee of noncommercial educational radio station WMFO(FM), 91.5 MHz, Medford, Massachusetts (the "Station"), by its attorneys, hereby files this petition for reconsideration by the Audio Services Division, Mass Media Bureau, of its action of April 30, 1999 (the "Division Action") terminating Tufts's authority to operate the Station and deleting the Station's call letters. 1/

The Division Action letter stated that the license to operate the Station was being terminated and the **call** letters deleted because the Commission had no record of receiving a license renewal application for the Station and the license had expired by its own terms on April 1, 1998.

<sup>&</sup>lt;u>1</u>/ Public Notice of the Division Action was issued on May 5, 1999 (Report No. 24480); consequently, this petition is timely **filed** pursuant to Sections **1.4(b)** and **1.106(f)** of the Commission's Rules.

Contemporaneously with the filing of this petition, Tufts is filing its renewal application for the Station, and requests that the Commission reconsider the Division Action so that it may consider such renewal application. As set forth in the attached Declaration, the failure to timely file a renewal application for the Station was inadvertent. The former mailing address for FCC correspondence to the Station was for the Station's student-staffed studio, and the school administration never received the original renewal application forms and booklet sent by the FCC. After an internal routing delay, the school administration did receive in January 1999, the Commission's letter of November 19, 1998, notifying the Station of the need to promptly file the Station's renewal application. In response, the Associate Director of Student Activities at Tufts contacted the FCC to request renewal forms and instructions and to submit an address change listing the address of the Office of Student Activities. After receipt of the forms, the Associate Director prepared a draft of the renewal application and ownership report, which drafts were under review at the University's offices when the Division Action was taken. ### **DECLARATION**

- I, Ralph Perrotto, do hereby declare under penalty of perjury, that the following statements are true and accurate to the best of my personal knowledge, information and belief:
- 1. I am Associate Director of Student Activities, at Tufts University, **Medford**, Massachusetts. Among my duties is the coordination of filings with the Federal Communications Commission ("FCC") relating to Station **WMFO(FM)**, Medford, Massachusetts (the "Station").
- **2.** Prior to February 1999, the mailing address on the FCC's records for the Station was for the Station's student-staffed studio. Consequently, it appears that FCC mailings were not always forwarded to the school administration. In February 1999, I submitted to the FCC a change of mailing address form for the Station, **specifying** the address for the Office of Student Activities.
- 3. The administration of the University has no record of receiving the renewal packet that the **FCC** would have sent to the Station prior to the Station's license expiration. The November 19, 1998 letter sent to the Station by the FCC was forwarded to the University's administrative offices sometime in January 1999. At that time, I made several calls to the FCC in an effort to obtain the renewal forms and instructions for the Station's renewal. Eventually, I learned about their availability on the FCC's web-site and obtained the forms from that site.
- 4. I prepared the Form 303-S (renewal application), and obtained a draft statement from the Station's consulting engineer establishing RF radiation compliance. I also prepared an initial draft of the Form 323-E (ownership report). I had forwarded the renewal application and ownership report to the Trustee's office for their review, completion and signature. That process was underway when the University received the FCC's letter of April 30, 1999, regarding the cancellation of the Station's license. Shortly thereafter, the University retained communications counsel in Washington, D.C. to assist in finalizing the renewal application and to request reinstatement of the Station's license.
- **5.** I anticipate now that FCC correspondence is going directly to the University's administrative offices, that the University will be able to timely respond to FCC correspondence and **filing** requirements.
- 6. The Station provides a unique and fulfilling experience for the University's students and broadcasts programming serving the needs and interests of the community. The University requests that the FCC reinstate and renew the Station's operating authority so that it may continue to serve the public.

# **Engineering Statement**

The engineering exhibit of which this statement is part was prepared in accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the Federal Communications Commission and pursuant to the provisions of Section V-B of FCC Form 340 on behalf of Tufts University (hereafter, Tufts), in support of an application for construction permit to modify the antenna system for station WMFO, Medford, Station WMFO operates on channel 218A with a directional Massachusetts. antenna which produces a maximum effective radiated power of 125 watts (H&V) along an axis of 90 degrees true. The antenna radiation center height above average terrain is 41 meters. By means of the instant proposal, Tufts seeks to add another antenna which will permit improved coverage toward the southwest, a region of suppressed radiation from the existing antenna. Specifically, a Scala, model HDCA-5, Yagi-type antenna would be added such that the center line of the main lobe of radiation would be oriented 240 degrees true.

Authorization of the construction proposed herein would be categorically excluded from environmental processing pursuant to the provisions of Section 1.1306 of the Rules. A discussion concerning this matter is presented in later paragraphs. Since the proposed construction will not increase the height of the existing antenna supporting structure, notification to the Federal Aviation Administration has not been made. As will be demonstrated elsewhere herein, the instant proposal is one for a minor change.

### Proposed Equipment

As earlier mentioned, Tufts proposes to add a Scala, model HDCA-5, Yagi-type antenna with the main lobe of radiation oriented 240 degrees true to the existing antenna supporting structure. Figure I is a vertical plane sketch showing the antenna supporting structure and elevation data for both the present and proposed antennas. Figure 2 is a map showing the transmitter site The existing Telrex Laboratories (hereafter, Telrex), model and vicinity. CR78-98, antenna consists of two bays: one horizontally polarized and the The bays are mounted colinearly and are oriented other vertically polarized. such that the main beam of radiation for each is along an axis of 90 degrees Each Telrex antenna bay has a maximum gain of 4.32 and the current authorization is for a maximum effective radiated power of 125 watts (H&V). No change in that antenna is proposed. A 50%/50% power splitter feeds each antenna bay with power of 29 watts so as to produce maximum effective radiated power of 125 watts along the 90-degree true bearing. antenna, a Scala, model HDCA-5, will be installed on the opposite side of the tower so as to produce maximum radiation along an azimuth of 240 degrees The maximum power gain for the Scala antenna is 5.6. The antenna true. input power will be 14.3 watts, resulting in a maximum effective radiated power of 80 watts for the Scala antenna.

The Telrex and Scala antennas will be fed power in phase. Because of the manner of mounting of the Telrex and **Scala** antennas and the high degree of radiation suppression each antenna has in the direction of the other, little interaction is expected. However, in the interest of conservatism and taking into account the 90-degree space phase lag that one antenna pattern will have with respect to the other, a composite pattern has been developed for best-case coverage and for **worst-case** allocation consideration scenarios. Figure 3 is a tabulation of data for the horizontal radiation patterns for each

antenna separately and for the derived composite pattern with the composite pattern given in terms of relative field and in terms of effective radiated power in decibels referenced to one kilowatt. Figure 4, Sheet I, shows the individual antenna radiation patterns in terms of relative field and the composite pattern derived by vector addition taking into account the 90-degree space phase lag of the Scala antenna with respect to the Telrex antenna. Figure 4, Sheet 2, shows the composite pattern in terms of **dBk** for convenient use in the coverage and allocation studies provided herein.

The transmitter power output will be fed by means of 75 feet of Cablewave, type FCC 12-50J, transmission line to an 82-percent/18-percent power splitter. Eighty-two percent of the power will be fed to the Telrex antenna and 18 percent will be fed to the Scala antenna. The 82-percent power to the Telrex antenna will again be split so as to feed equal amounts of power to the horizontally polarized and vertically polarized antenna elements. The following table shows the power budget for the system.

## Coverage Contours

Figure 5 is a tabulation of elevation data and distances to the present and proposed 1 mV/m contours for WMFO. Those contours are plotted on Figure 6. The present WMFO 1 mV/m contour includes 72 square kilometers. With the addition of the Scala antenna, the new I mV/m contour includes 89 square kilometers, for a net gain of 17 square kilometers. The change in 1 mV/m area is 24 percent referenced to the 1 mV/m area for the present operation. According to FCC criteria, the proposed change is considered "minor."

### Allocation Considerations

In the design of the **modified** antenna system, consideration **has** been given to allocation factors involving close-by stations on the same channel as WMFO and on channels within plus and minus 600 kilohertz of **WMFO's** channel 218 (91.5 megahertz). No concern arises regarding stations 53 and 54 channels removed from channel 218. Also, consideration has been given to prospective interference to channel 6 television station WLNE, New **Bedford**, Massachusetts, and to the impact of the proposal with regard to the <u>Working Agreement for Allocation of FM Broadcasting Stations on Channels 201-30Q</u> under the Canada-United States FM Agreement of 1947, since WMFO is within 320 kilometers of the common border between the United States and Canada.

Turning first to cochannel and adjacent channel allocation concerns, Figure 7 is a map showing the complete 60 dBu F(50,50), 54 dBu F(50,10), and 40 dBu F(50,10) contours for the proposed WMFO operation based on the composite pattern of Figure 4, Sheet 2. The map shows also the appropriate contour arcs for other stations close enough to merit consideration with respect to the proposed WMFO operation, except for station WBUR, Boston, Massachusetts. The map of Figure 7 demonstrates that the proposed operation will neither cause nor receive interference from any station.

With respect to station WBUR, which operates on channel 215B with maximum effective radiated power of 7.2 kW and antenna radiation center height above average terrain of 305 meters, the proposed WMFO operation will result in slightly increased overlap of specified contours over that currently occurring. Stations WMFO and WBUR are separated 14 kilometers from one another. The WBUR signal strength at the WMFO transmitter site is 83.5 dBu based on a maximum effective radiated power of 7.2 kW and antenna radiation center height above average terrain of 323 meters in the WMFO direction, 37

degrees true. The WMFO new Scala antenna will produce increased overlap of the undesired 123.5 dBu contour with the WBUR desired 83.5 dBu contour within an angular range of approximately 100 degrees centered on 240 degrees true. The maximum effective radiated power within the bracket angle will be 85 watts (-10.7 dBk). Assuming free-space propagation, the 123.5 dBu (1.5 V/m) contour extends outward, at most, 43 meters, or less than 150 feet from the antenna. At that distance, the contour does not extend beyond the campus green of the University. Hence, no actual interference to WBUR will occur. In the event a waiver of the FCC's Rule in this regard is required, a waiver is requested. Figure 8 is a tabulation of the data employed in preparing the allocation study map of Figure 7.

Station WMFO is located within the Grade B contour of channel 6 station WLNE, New Bedford, Massachusetts. The increased radiation proposed in the southwesterly direction will result in increased interference according to the criteria established in Section 73.525(e) of the Rules. However, the interference area is entirely outside the Providence-New Bedford area of dominant influence (ADI) in which WLNE is located, and completely outside the Grade A field strength contour for station WLNE. Also, the interference area is within the predicted City Grade field strength contour of station WNEV, Boston, channel 7, which has the same network affiliation, CBS, as does station WLNE. Figure 9 depicts the Providence-New Bedford ADI, the WLNE Grade A and Grade B contours, and the City Grade contour for station WNEV.

The projected interference from WMFO is based on a simplified assumption of uniform radiation of 125 watts in all directions using a maximum possible undesired to desired ratio of 32.5 dB as **determined** from Figure 2 of Section 73.599 of the Rules. The coarse assumptions made overstate the interference area, but since the area involved is too small for precise definition, and, in any event, Section 73.525(e)(3)(iii) permits the entire

interference population to be excluded from the 3000-person limit otherwise permitted. a precise demarcation of the interference zone is unnecessary. In other words, the exact definition of the area and the exact number of **persons** involved ore not critical since all the persons involved are deductible. With all the tests having been met for nonviewership of WLNE in the vicinity of the WMFO transmitter, no actual interference occurs now, or would occur if the instant proposal is implemented.

With respect to the provisions of the **Working** Aareement for Allocation of FM Broadcast Stations on Channels 201–300 under the **Canada-**United States FM Agreement of 1947, the instant proposal is in compliance. The proposed antenna addition will not result in any measurable increase in radiation toward the Canadian boundary. Hence, insofar as Canada is concerned, the proposal has no impact.

### Environmental Impact considerations

The proposed construction is categorically excluded from environmental processing pursuant to the provisions of Section 1.1306(b) of the Rules. Since the only new construction involved is the addition of an antenna to an existing antenna supporting structure, the concerns of Section 1.1306(b)(1) and (2) are not involved. Only the provision of sub-section (3) concerning radio-frequency radiation exposure merits attention.

The WMFO antenna supporting tower is mounted atop the roof of Ballou Hall on the Tufts University Campus. The lowest antenna element is 6.4 **meters** above the rooftop level. Assuming maximum effective radiated power for all three antennas concentrated in the lowest antenna element; **i.e.**, 335 watts, all the energy directed downward, and a 1.6 reflection coefficient. the I milliwatt per square centimeter maximum allowed under the FCC's

adopted ANSI C95.1-1982 guideline occurs at a distance of 3.4 meters below the lowest antenna element. With the lowest antenna element being 6.4 meters above the rooftop, a clearance of three **meters**, or roughly ten feet, from the rooftop level results. Hence no person on the rooftop or at any location below the rooftop would experience excessive radiation.

Warning signs will be placed on the antenna supporting tower so that any worker who may have occasion to climb the tower will be forewarned of possible exposure hazard and will be able to coordinate his work effort in a manner which will not result in excessive exposure.

Based on the foregoing, the proposed construction is categorically excluded from environmental processing according to the FCC's rules implementing the Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

Dear Ms. Repp:

We have on file Tufts University's ("Tufts") petition for reconsideration of the April 30, 1999, staff action terminating authority to operate the above-referenced station and deleting the call sign. Pursuant to 1.106 of the Commission's rules reconsideration IS GRANTED and the WMFO(FM) call sign IS REINSTATED. Additionally, Tufts' June 3, 1999, renewal application (File No. BRED-990603YA) IS ACCEPTED FOR FILING and Special Temporary Authority IS GRANTED to **allow** continued operation pending consideration and final action on the license renewal application.

We remind Tufts that Commission policy encourages the submission of complete information at an early stage to ensure administrative orderliness and to minimize the need for reconsideration proceedings. See, e.g., Carolyn Hagedorn, 11 FCC Rcd 1659 (1996); see generally Colorado Radio Corp. v. FCC, 118 F.2d 24, 26 (D.C. Cir. 1941). However, under the circumstances where an operating station continues to serve the community, we find that the applicant has made a sufficient showing that the public interest warrants grant of reconsideration. We note that the actions taken in this letter are without prejudice to whatever further action the Commission may deem appropriate in connection with the late-filed renewal application.

# PETITION FOR RECONSIDERATION

Tufts University ("Tufts"), the licensee of noncommercial educational radio station **WMFO(FM)**, 91.5 MHz, Medford, Massachusetts (the "Station"), by its attorneys, hereby files this petition for reconsideration by the Audio Services Division, Mass Media Bureau, of its action of April 30, 1999 (the "Division Action") terminating Tufts's authority to operate the Station and deleting the Station's call letters. 1/

The Division Action letter stated that the license to operate the Station was being terminated and the call letters deleted because the Commission had no record of receiving a license renewal application for the Station and the license had expired by its own terms on April 1, 1998.

Public Notice of the Division Action was issued on May 5, 1999 (Report No. 24480); consequently, this petition is timely filed pursuant to Sections 1.4(b) and 1.106(f) of the Commission's Rules.

Contemporaneously with the filing of this petition, Tufts is filing its renewal application for the Station, and requests that the Commission reconsider the Division Action so that it may consider such renewal application. As set forth in the attached Declaration, the failure to timely file a renewal application for the Station was inadvertent. The former mailing address for FCC correspondence to the Station was for the Station's student-staffed studio, and the school administration never received the original renewal application forms and booklet sent by the FCC. After an internal routing delay, the school administration did receive in January 1999, the Commission's letter of November 19, 1998, notifying the Station of the need to promptly file the Station's renewal application. In response, the Associate Director of Student Activities at Tufts contacted the FCC to request renewal forms and instructions and to submit an address change listing the address of the Office of Student Activities. After receipt of the forms, the Associate Director prepared a draft of the renewal application and ownership report, which drafts were under review at the University's offices when the Division Action was taken. Following receipt of the Division Action letter, Tufts retained communications counsel to assist in finalizing the renewal application, which has resulted in its completion and filing. 2/ Counsel for Tufts has also filed with the Commission Tufts's request for special temporary authority to continue operations of the Station under its call letters until such time as the Commission acts on this petition and the Station's renewal application.

Tufts is still in the process of finalizing its ownership report on Form 323-E, and will file such report upon its completion.

In sum, the renewal application for the Station was not filed in a timely manner due to inadvertence and internal routing difficulties. Tufts has corrected the mailing address for the Station and has completed and filed its renewal application. The renewal application establishes the basis for renewal of the Station's authorization. So that the Station's renewal application may be acted on by the Commission, it is respectfully submitted that the Division Action should be reconsidered. - I, Ralph **Perrotto**, do hereby declare under penalty of pe**rjury**, that the following statements are true and accurate to the best of my personal knowledge, information and belief:
- 1. I am Associate Director of Student Activities, at Tufts University, Medford, Massachusetts. Among my duties is the coordination of filings with the Federal Communications Commission ("FCC") relating to Station **WMFO(FM)**, Medford, Massachusetts (the "Station").
- 2. Prior to February 1999, the mailing address on the FCC's records for the Station was for the Station's student-staffed studio. Consequently, it appears that FCC mailings were not always forwarded to the school administration. In February 1999, I submitted to the FCC a change of mailing address form for the Station, specifying the address for the Office of Student Activities.
- 3. The administration of the University has no record of receiving the renewal packet that the FCC would have sent to the Station prior to the Station's license expiration. The November 19, 1998 letter sent to the Station by the FCC was forwarded to the University's administrative offices sometime in January 1999. At that time, I made several calls to the FCC in an effort to obtain the renewal forms and instructions for the Station's renewal. Eventually, I learned about their availability on the FCC's web-site and obtained the forms from that site.

This letter is in reference to the above-captioned minor change application to add a directional antenna to the existing directional antenna.

An engineering study has revealed that your proposal would receive objectional interference, based on contour overlap, from the licensed facility (BLH-982) of co-channel Class A FM station WJUL, Lowell, Massachusetts. The enclosed computerized contour overlap study shows that WMFO's proposed protected (60 dBu) contour would overlap WJUL's licensed interfering (40 dBu) contour by as much as 0.58 kilometers between the 250' and 290' radials (relative to WMFO). Therefore, you proposal is in violation of 47 C.F.R. § 73.509. This prohibited overlap, which was not addressed in your application, renders it unacceptable for filing pursuant to 47 C.F.R. § 73.3566(a).

In addition, your proposal would cause increased objectional interference, based on contour overlap, to the licensed facility (BLED-870518KC) of third-adjacent Channel Class B FM station WBUR, Boston, Massachusetts. Specifically, your proposal's interfering (100 dBu) contour would increase the overlap caused to WBUR's protected (60 dBu) contour. Therefore, your proposal is in violation of 47 C.F.R. § 73.509.

You state that the proposed WMFO operation will result in slightly increased overlap of WMFO's undesired 123.5 dBu contour with WBUR's desired 83.5 dBu contour. You further state that "...the contour does not extend beyond the campus green of the University. Hence, no actual interference to WBUR will occur." Finally, you state that in the event a waiver of the FCC's Rule is required, a waiver is requested.

Since your proposed interfering (100 dBu) contour would extend beyond your licensed 100 dBu contour, the present overlap caused to wbur's facilities would be increased in contravention of 47 C.F.R. S 73.509. This also renders your application unacceptable for filing.

Even if you had properly requested waiver of 47 C.F.R. \$ 73.509, while you state in your proposal that the interfering contour would not extend beyond the University campus lawn, you did not provide any information regarding the area of predicted interference gained or the number of persons affected. Instead, the basis of your waiver request rests entirely upon the conclusory assertion that "the proposed WMFO operation will result in <u>slightly</u> increased overlap Insufficient data was submitted to support this assertion. unreasonable to expect the Commission to reach the public interest finding necessary to waive its interference protection rules based solely on an applicant's determination that the increase in prohibited overlap would only be "slight" and that the increase in service area would be "substantial" without specific data to support this determination. The burden is on the applicant seeking waiver to plead specific facts and circumstances which would make the general rule inapplicable. See Tucson Radio, Inc. v. FCC, 452 F.2d 1380, 1382 (D.C. Cir. 1971). Additionally, there is no indication in the application that WBUR has consented to the proposed increase in prohibited overlap. Therefore, we could not have concluded that the facts and circumstances set forth in your application were sufficient to establish that a grant of a waiver would better serve the public interest than adherence to the rule. Accordingly, the request for waiver of 47 C.F.R. S 73.509 would have been denied.

In addition, an engineering study reveals that your proposed directional antenna pattern has a maximum rate of change of 2.77 dB per 10 degrees between the 280' and 290' radials. This is in violation of 47 C.F.R. \$ 73.316 (b) (2) which restricts the maximum rate of change to 2 dB per 10 degrees. The Commission's policy regarding the 2 dB per 10 degrees rate of change limitation is longstanding and has been consistently applied to all FM directional stations for many years. The requirements for both commercial and educational stations were reaffirmed in the Report and Order in Docket 87-121, 54 Fed. Reg. 09800, adopted December 12, 1988, released February 22, 1989. Exceptions to this policy have been limited primarily to stations employing directional antennas for sole purpose of protecting non-broadcast facilities such as quiet zones or Commission monitoring stations or to avoid wasting power over large bodies of water. In the present case, none of these situations are applicable.

Moreover, you propose to add the Scala directional antenna to the existing Telrex Laboratories directional antenna. You state that the addition of the Scala antenna is to improve the existing coverage area toward the southwest region, a region of suppressed radiation from the existing antenna. You further state that because of the manner of mounting of the Telrex and Scala antennas and the high degree of radiation suppression each antenna has in the direction of the other, little interaction is expected. However, pursuant to 47 C.F.R. § 73.1620(a)(2), a proof of performance for any directional antenna must be submitted before program test authority will be granted. Therefore, you must specify how the proof of performance will be accomplished.

Pursuant to 47 C.F.R. § 73.525 (b) (4), applications for modification must include a certification that the applicant has given early written notice of the proposed modification to all affected TV Channel 6 TV stations. A review of the application reveals that no certification was submitted.

**Finally,** if you **resubmit** the application, you must include a statement stating the **permittee** will reduce power or **cease** operation as necessary to assure safety with respect to **radiofrequency** radiation.

Accordingly, the request for waiver of 47 C.F.R. \$ 73.509 with respect to Station WBUR (FM) IS HEREBY DENIED and, for the reasons stated above, Application EPED-920806IA IS HEREBY DISMISSED. This action is taken pursuant to 47 C.F.R. \$ 0.283.

- TRUSTEES OF TUFTS COLLEGE. The corporation may also be known as and use the name TUFTS UNIVERSITY.

  The purposes for which the corporation is formed are as follows: include any one or more of the following:
- (1) To conduct a university not for profit, including colleges and schools and centers (graduate, undergraduate and professional) associated or affiliated therewith, in various branches within or without the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.
- college to be known as the "Jackson College for Women: to appropriate and set apart for the maintenance thereof any sums designated by the donors to be for the education of women, and all property, real, personal or mixed, tangible or intangible, received by gift, grant, devise, bequest or otherwise for that purpose; and to confer upon women, in the name of Jackson College for Women, any of the degrees which it by law is authorized to confer. All the provisions contained in these Restated Articles of Organization shall relate to the Jackson College for Women, so far as applicable thereto, except as otherwise expressly provided herein

NOTE: If provisions for which the space provided under **Articles 2, 3 and 4 is** not sufficient **additions should b** set out on continuation sheets to be numbered 2A, **2B**, etc. Indicate under each Article where the **provision i** set **out**. **Continuation sheets shall be** on 8½" x 11" paper and must have a left-hand **margin 1 inch** wide for binding. Only one side should be used.

3 If the corporation has more than one class of members, the designation of such classes, the manner of election or appointment, the duration of membership and the qualification and rights, including voting rights, of the members of each contact are as follows:—

The corporation shall have thirty-one members, all of whom shall be known as trustees and have the powers of diractors. members shall be known as Charter Trustees and shall be elected by the members of the corporation then serving in office. Ten members shall be known as Alumni Trustees and shall be elected from among the alumni of the corporation's colleges and schools either by the alumni acting directly or by such representatives of the alumni as may be chosen members of a representative group. The president of the corporation shall be a member of the corporation, ex officio, during the term of his office as president. Members of the corporation in office on August 5, 1970, other than **alumni** members, shall continue in office without limit of time, and Alumni Trustees then in office shall continue in office until the expiration of the terms to which they were elected. Except as herein specified, the qualifications, terms of office and manner of election of the members of the corporation shall be as specified from time to **time** in the by-laws of the corporation.

Other lawful provisions, if any, for the conduct and regulation of the business and affairs of the corporation, for its voluntary dissolution, or for limiting, defining, or regulating the powers of the corporation, or of its directors or members, or of any class of members, are as follows:—

- (A) The corporation shall have and may exercise in furtherance of its corporate purposes the following powers:
  - (1) To have perpetual succession in its corporate name.
  - (2) To sue and be sued.
- (3) To have a corporate seal which it may alter at pleasure, and to use upon diplomas and other written instruments issued in the name of Jackson College for Women a seal of a design different from the common seal of the corporation.
  - (4) To award certificates, diplomas and degrees.
- (5) To elect or appoint trustees (as provided by Article 3 of **these** Restated Articles), officers, faculty, staff, employees and other agents; to fix their compensation, if any, and to define their duties and obligations.
- (6) To purchase, receive, take by grant, gift, devise, bequest or otherwise, lease, or otherwise acquire, own, hold, improve, employ, use and otherwise deal in and with, real or personal property, or any interest therein, wherever situated.

- (3) To promote, advance, evaluate and **disseminate** learning by instruction, study, clinical practice and research in the humanities, religion, social sciences, international law and diplomacy, natural sciences, medical, dental and health sciences, engineering and applied sciences, and any other branch of learning.
- (4) To engage in and participate in projects of education, clinical practice, research and social service for the benefit of international agencies and of national, state and local governments of the United States 'and other countries, and for the general welfare.
- (5) To establish and maintain a hospital for the reception and care of persons who may reed medical or surgical treatment during sickness or while suffering from an injury; to acquire by gift, devise or purchase, any hospital new or hereafter established under the laws of the Commonwealth for the purposes aforesaid and thereafter maintain any hospital so ecquired.

The foregoing enumeration shall not be deemed in any manner to limit or affect the right of the corporation to pursue, exercise and enjoy any more general purposes or objects than those enumerated herein or any other purposes or objects of the same nature as, or a different nature from, those herein specified which the laws of this Commonwealth would, but for such enumeration, allow it to pursue, exercise and enjoy.

- (7) To solicit and receive contributions from any and all Sources and to receive and hold, in trust or otherwise, funds received by gift or bequest.
- (8) To sell, convey, lease, exchange, transfer or otherwise dispose of, or mortgage, pledge, encumber or create a security interest in, all or any of its property, or any interest therein, wherever situated.
- (9) To purchase, take, receive, subscribe for, or otherwise acquire, own, hold, vote, employ, sell, lend, lease, exchange, transfer, or **otherwise** dispose of, mortgage, pledge, use and otherwise deal in and with, bonds and other obligations, shares, or other securities or interests issued by others engaged in business, governmental, or other activities.
- (10) To make contracts, give guarantees and incur liabilities, borrow money at such rates of interest as the corporation may determine, issue its notes, bonds and other obligations, and secure any of its obligations by mortgage, pledge or encumbrance of, or security interest in, all or any of its property or any interest therein, wherever situated.
- (11) To lend money, invest and reinvest its funds, and take and hold real and personal property as security for the payment of funds so loaned or invested.
- (12) To carry on its operations and have offices and exercise the powers granted by Massachusetts General Laws, . Chapter 180, in any jurisdiction within or without the United States.
- (13) To make donations to religious, charitable, scientific, literary or educational institutions of the type described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of the United States, in such amounts as the trustees shall determine.
- (14) To participate as a subscriber in the exchanging of insurance contracts specified in Massachusetts General Laws, Chapter 175, Section 94B.
- (15) **To** pay pensions, establish and carry out pension, savings, thrift and other retirement, incentive and benefit plans, trusts and provisions for any or all of its officers and employees.

- (16) To commingle any property or funds acquired by it with any other such property or funds except as may be contrary to any restrictions or conditions applicable to particular property or funds; to maintain and establish such pooled funds or other accounts as may be deemed advisable from time to time, and to hold and to invest and reinvest any property in which it may have any interest of any kind in such pooled funds or other accounts or separately in its discretion, subject, however, to any applicable trusts, terms, conditions or restrictions thereon.
- (17) To act as executor, administrator, administrator with the will annexed, trustee under the will, deed or otherwise, of or in any other fiduciary capacity with respect to any estate or trust in which it may have any beneficial interest of any kind whatsoever, if so permitted by the law of any state of the United States or country or other authority having jurisdiction of the administration of such estate or trust.
- (18) To make, amend, or repeal by-laws, rules and orders, in whole or in part, not inconsistent with the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, with reasonable penalties, for the good government of the university and otherwise for the management of its property and the regulation of its affairs.
- (19) To provide for the selection of its students and for the government and well-being of its students, faculty and staff while in pursuit of the **corporation's** purposes either at the university, or at any institution affiliated, allied or otherwise associated therewith, or elsewhere.
- (20) To determine and regulate the courses of instruction offered in any of the colleges or schools comprising the university.
- (21) To do any or all of the things hereinabove set forth in any part of the world as principal, agent, contractor or otherwise, and either directly or indirectly, alone or in cooperation or in association with others, and to do every other act or thing which is necessary or desirable in order to carry out the foregoing purposes or any part or parts thereof.
- (22) To delegate to other agencies or organizations such of the corporation's powers, for such periods of time, and subject to such terms and conditions, as the corporation shall from time to time determine.

- (B) The Board of Trustees, consisting of the members of the corporation, shall manage and conduct the property and affairs of the corporation and may exercise any and all of its powers.
- (C) The corporation shall indemnify, to the extent legally permissible but not to the extent that the status of the corporation as an organization exempt under Section 501(c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code will be affected thereby, each trustee against all liabilities and expenses, including amounts paid in satisfaction of judgments, in compromise or as fines and penalties, and counsel fees, reasonably incurred by such trustee in connection with the defense or disposition of any action, suit or other proceeding, whether civil or criminal, in which such trustee may be involved or with which such trustee may be threatened, while in office or thereafter, by reason of being or having been a trustee of the corporation or by reason of any alleged acts or omissions by him or her as a trustee; provided, however, that as to any matter disposed of by a compromise payment by a trustee of the corporation pursuant to a consent decree or otherwise, no indemnification either for said payment or for any other expenses shall be provided unless such compromise shall be approved as in the best interests of the corporation, after notice that such approval will result in such indemnification, by (a) a majority of the disinterested trustees of the corporation then in office if there has been obtained an opinion in writing of independent legal counsel to the effect that such trustee appears to have acted in good faith in the reasonable belief that his or her action was in the best interests of the corporation, or (b) a majority of the trustees of the corporation then in office if such majority consists of Expenses, including counsel fees, disinterested trustees. reasonably incurred by any such trustee in connection with the defense or disposition of any such action, suit or other proceeding may be paid from time to time by the corporation in advance of the final disposition thereof upon receipt of an undertaking by such trustee to repay the amount so paid to the corporation in the event that he or she shall be adjudicated to be not entitled to indemnification or in the event that such proceeding shall have been disposed of by a compromise payment which has not been approved in the manner aforesaid. standing anything to the contrary contained herein, the corporation shall not indemnify any trustee with respect to any matter as to which such trustee shall have been adjudicated in any proceeding not to have acted in good faith in the reasonable belief that his or her action was in the best interests of the

corporation. The indemnification of trustees provided for herein shall not be exclusive or affect any other rights to which any such trustee may be entitled by contract or otherwise under law. As used in this paragraph, the term "trustee" shall include any member or former member of the Board of Trustees and the heirs, executors and administrators of any such member or former member, and a "disinterested" trustee shall mean one against whom in such capacity neither the proceedings in question nor another proceeding on the same or similar grounds is then threatened, pending or completed,

- (D) No part of the assets or net earnings of the corporation shall be divided among or inure to the benefit of any officer or trustee of the corporation or any private individual or be appropriated for any purpose other than the purposes of the corporation as herein set forth; and no substantial part of the activities of the corporation shall be the carrying on of propaganda, or otherwise attempting, to influence legislation, and the corporation shall not participate in or intervene in (including the publishing or distributing of statements) any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office. No officer, member or employee of the corporation shall receive or be entitled to receive any pecuniary profit from the operations of the corporation except reasonable compensation for services rendered to it, It is intended that the corporation shall be entitled to **exemption from** federal **income** tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of the United States and that it shall not be a private foundation under Section 509(a) of said Internal Revenue Code. Upon the liquidation or dissolution of the corporation, after payment of all of the liabilities of the corporation or due provision therefor, all of the assets of the corporation shall be distributed to one or more Organizations exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of the United States as determined by the Board of Trustees in its sole discretion.
- (E) All references herein to a statute shall be deemed to refer to suck statute as now in force and **as** the same may from time to tine hereafter be amended, or any successor provisions thereto,

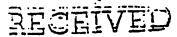

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#### BYLAWS OF TRUSTEES OF TUFTS COLLEGE

#### **Article I**

#### THE CORPORATION

1.1 The legal corporate name of the Corporation is TRUSTEES OF **TUFTS** COLLEGE, under which name the management and execution of its business affairs are conducted. The name TUFTS COLLEGE is to be employed when **referring** collectively to the College of Liberal Arts and the College of Engineering and to their particular activities. The name TUFTS **UNIVERSITY** is to be **employed** when **referring** to the institution in its entirety and inclusive of its undergraduate, graduate and professional schools and other activities of the institution as a whole.

#### Article II

#### THE TRUSTEES

#### 2.1 AUTHORITY. RESPONSIBILITY AND NUMBER

**2.1.1.1 AUTHORITY AND RESPONSIBILITY.** The Board of Trustees shall have the authority to carry out all lawful functions which are permitted by these Bylaws or by the Restated Articles of Organization. This authority shall include but shall not be limited to the following: (a) periodically review and approve the University's mission and purposes; (b) appoint the President who shall be the University's chief executive officer, and set appropriate conditions of employment, including compensation; (c) establish the conditions of employment of other key institutional officers; (d) support the President and assess his or her performance; (e) review and **approve** proposed major changes in the University's academic programs and other major enterprises consistent with the University's mission, plans and financial resources; (f) approve institutional policies bearing on faculty appointment, promotion, tenure and dismissal; (g) approve the annual budget and annual tuition/fees; (h) regularly monitor the University's financial condition, and establish policy guidelines affecting all institutional assets including investments and the physical plant; (i) contribute financially to the University's **fundraising** goals and participate actively in strategies to secure sources of support; (i) authorize debt financing and approve the securitization of loans; (k) authorize the construction of

new buildings, major renovations of existing buildings, and upkeep of the physical

plant; (I) approve all **earned** and honorary degrees; (m) periodically undertake or authorize assessments of the Board's **performance**.

- 2.1.1.2 The Board of Trustees may delegate any of its authority or responsibility to any committee established by Article V, subject to the provisions of these Bylaws.
- 2.1.2 **NUMBER.** The Board of Trustees shall consist of not less than twenty-eight nor more than forty-one members.
  - 2.2 **CLASSES.** The members of the Board shall be classified as follows:
  - **2.2.1 CHARTER TRUSTEES.** Thirty in number, to be elected by the Board to serve for **terms** of five years which expire at the annual meeting of the Board. Any Trustee whose term extends beyond the date when such Trustee attains the age of seventy-five years except **as** provided in Section 2.3.5, will serve only until the annual meeting which coincides in date with or next follows the date of such attainment. At any election of Trustees, there may be elected up to the maximum number of Charter Trustees permitted under the foregoing provision. The **term** of any Charter Trustees permitted under the foregoing provision. The **term** of any Charter Trustee elected prior to November 1, 1999, shall not be affected by this Section.
  - **2.2.2 ALUMNI TRUSTEES.** Ten in number, to be elected by ballot by and from the alumni, to serve for terms of five years, such service to begin with the annual meeting of the Board of Trustees following the election. The term "alumni" **as** used in this Article II shall be deemed to include (a) each person who has received a degree **from** the University or from the Eliot-Pearson School or the Boston School of Occupational Therapy prior to the affiliation of said schools with the University and (b) each non degree-holding former student of the University who has pursued an approved course of study in the University for at least one academic year, provided that the prescribed period for completion of said course of study shall have passed. The term of any Alumni Trustee elected prior to November 1, 1999, shall not be affected by this Section.
  - 2.2.3 **TRUSTEE EX OFFICIO.** The President of the University during such President's term of office, Charter Trustees, Alumni Trustees and the Trustee ex officio shall have the same duties, rights and powers.

#### 2.3 ELECTION OF CHARTER TRUSTEES.

- 2.3.1 The Charter Trustees shall be elected by majority vote of the members of the Board of Trustees present and voting. Their election need not be by ballot but may be by ballot if requested by three or more Trustees present. If the election is by ballot, it shall be conducted in **accordance** with the following provisions. On the first ballot each Trustee voting shall enter on the ballot the name of no more than two nominees (or one if only one Charter Trustee of the class is to be elected) for election as Charter Trustees of the particular class and the name of any nominee no more than once on any ballot, and shall submit the ballot to one of the tellers appointed by the **Chairman.** The tellers will tally and report to the Chairman the total number of ballots cast and the number of votes cast for each nominee. A nominee receiving votes equal to or exceeding in number a majority of the ballots cast shall be declared elected. If no nominee, or only one nominee is elected, succeeding ballots shall be taken in the same manner as the first, except that voting shall be for only one nominee if the first ballot resulted in the election of one member. On the second and succeeding ballots, the nominee having the smallest number of votes in the next preceding ballot shall be excluded from consideration.
- 2.3.2 The Board of Trustees may by majority vote designate one or more persons as alternates to a person elected to the **office** of Charter Trustee, and in the event that the person so elected shall decline to accept his or her election, the first of such alternates in the order designated by the Board who is willing to act in such office shall, upon his or her acceptance thereof, be deemed to be elected to said **office**. Voting with respect to the designation of such alternates shall be conducted in a manner similar **to** that provided in section 2.3.1 for the election of Charter Trustees.
- 2.3.3 Any Charter Trustee who has served a ten year term or consecutive **terms** totalling ten or more years shall not be eligible for reelection for a **term** commencing earlier than a year **after** the completion of such years of service. This subsection shall not apply in the case of a **Chairman** or Vice Chairmen in office, provided, however, that they shall only be eligible for reelection on a year-to-year basis. There shall be no more than three Vice Chairmen in office.
- 2.3.4 Any vacancy in the office of Charter Trustee may be filled by vote of the Board at any annual, regular or special meeting of the Board.
- 2.3.5 The Board of Trustees may in particular instances upon recommendation of the Committee on Trusteeship and by majority vote make exceptions to the qualifications as to age of any elected Charter Trustee or individual

proposed for election as Charter Trustee, provided that at no time will there be more than five Trustees over age seventy-five; and **further** provided that such exceptions will be made to fill a vacancy for the balance of any existing term.

- 2.4 **ELECTION OF ALUMNI TRUSTEES.** Alumni Trustees shall be elected by ballot by the alumni, such election to be conducted each year in accordance with rules and procedures adopted by the Alumni Council **as** the governing board of the Tufts University Alumni Association, Inc. and approved by the Board. Any vacancy in the office of Alumni Trustee shall be filled for the unexpired term by an election by ballot of the alumni conducted as aforesaid, provided, however, that if such vacancy occurs within one year prior to the expiration of the term, it need not be filled prior to such expiration.
- 2.5 **RESIGNATIONS.** Any Charter Trustee, Alumni Trustee or Trustee Emeritus may resign by notice in writing to the Secretary.

#### 2.6 TRUSTEES EMERITI.

- 2.6.1 Any Charter or Alumni Trustee may be elected by the Board as a Trustee Emeritus, subject to the following conditions: (a) at least one year but not more than six years have elapsed since the expiration of **his/her** term or resignation; (b) **he/she** served **as** a Trustee for at least five years; and (c) **he/she** is nominated by the Executive Committee.
- 2.6.2 Each year the Executive Committee will consider those persons who meet be requirements of 2.6.1 (a) and (b). The Executive Committee will nominate those who, in its opinion, provided leadership and service to the University above and beyond that normally expected of a Trustee.
- 2.6.3 Trustees Emeriti shall be entitled to receive notice of each meeting of the Board and may attend and participate with the Trustees in the meetings of the Board and at public academic occasions, but shall not be members of the Board and shall not have the privilege of voting or of holding any **office** which is to be filled by election or appointment **from** among the members of the Board. They shall not be counted in **determining** the number of Trustees required to constitute a quorum nor in determining the presence of a quorum; they may serve on committees of the Board where membership is not required.
- **2.7 REMOVAL.** The Board, by a two-thirds vote of all its members after giving the Trustee at **least** thirty days' notice and an opportunity to be heard shall have the power to remove any Charter or Alumni Trustee who shall be, in the judgment of the Board, disqualified for cause or permanently incapacitated **from** performing duties as Trustee.

2.8 **DISOUALIFICATION OF STAFF.** An acceptance of the **office** of Trustee by any person other than the President of the University shall be deemed a resignation from **any office** or position held on the educational or administrative staff in **any** of the departments of the University. Acceptance by a Trustee, other than the President, of any **office** or position on the educational or administrative staff in any of the departments of the University shall be deemed to be a resignation as a Trustee unless the **office** or position is less than full time, and the Executive Committee and the Board of Trustees have approved in advance the acceptance of said **office** (including its terms and conditions) or position and any renewal thereof.

#### Article III

#### THE OFFICERS OF THE CORPORATION

- 3.1 <u>THE OFFICERS</u>. The Officersof the Corporation shall be the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, up to three Vice Chairmen, the President of the University, the Treasurer and the Secretary, all of whom shall be elected at the annual meeting of the Trustees and shall hold office for one year or until their successors shall be duly elected and qualified, the Provost, the Executive Vice President, Senior Vice President, the Vice President for Arts, Sciences, and Engineering, and other officers, including without limitation those having titles which include the words "President," "Vice President," "Treasurer" or "Secretary," as the Board may from time to time elect or appoint, who shall serve at the will of the Board of Trustees.
- **3.2.1** <u>VACANCIES</u>. Any vacancy in any such **office** may be filled by the Executive Committee and the person so elected to fill the vacancy shall hold office until the next annual meeting or until his or her successor shall be duly elected and qualified.
- 3.2.2 **NEW POSITIONS.** In the intervals between meetings of the Board of Trustees, the Executive Committee may create and fill any position having a title which includes the words "Vice President", "Treasurer", or "Secretary". The person so elected shall hold office until the next annual meeting or until his or her successor shall be duly elected and qualified.
- 3.3 **THE CHAIRMAN**. The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall preside at the meetings of the Board and in the absence or disability of the Chairman a Vice Chairman shall perform the Chairman's duties.

#### 3.4 THE PRESIDENT.

3.4.1 The President of the University shall be both the leader of the educational policy and the chief executive officer of the University; the President **shall exercise** such leadership and **supervision of** its **administrative officers**, **teachers**, students, agents and employees as will promote the **efficiency** of each department and

of the University as a whole, and the President shall exercise a general superintendence over all of its concerns.

- **3.4.2** The President shall act as the ordinary medium of communication between the Trustees and the faculties, student body and alumni organizations.
- **3.4.3** The President shall make an annual report to the Trustees on the general condition of the University.
- **3.4.4** The President shall be responsible for the management of current operating revenues and expenditures in connection with the educational, purchasing and plant activities of the Corporation, have charge of collection of income, insurance and taxes relating to institutional real estate and be responsible for the preparation of the annual budget and the establishment of an adequate system of budget control. The budget shall be presented to the Trustee Committee on Administration and Finance for its approval, and if so approved, the Committee shall submit the budget to the Board of Trustees for its consideration and approval.
- **3.4.5** The President shall preside on public academic occasions; the President shall be President of the several Faculties.
- **3.4.6** The President shall have power to sign in the name and on behalf of the Corporation all duly authorized contracts, deeds and other instruments, including acceptances of gifts, bequests and devises to the University. Any such instrument may also be signed in the name and on behalf of the Corporation by any Vice President, the Chairman of the Board or any other person designated for that purpose by the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee.
- 3.4.7 Subject to such regulations, specific or general, as may be adopted **from** time to time by the Executive Committee, the President shall accept and give receipts for all gifts, devises and bequests to the Corporation, provided, however, that where a gift, devise or bequest is subject to a condition, the President may not bind the Corporation with respect to such condition without the approval of the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee, unless such condition is (a) that principal shall be retained and only income or capital increment be expended, or (b) that such gift, devise or bequest be held by the University as trustee of a charitable remainder **unitrust** or annuity trust as defined in the Internal Revenue Code now in **force** or hereafter amended. Subject to such regulations as aforesaid, the President shall be responsible for all matters of probate and other legal matters in connection with gifts, devises, bequests, trust and annuity contracts and shall have the power to assent to accounts and other matters of probate in which the Corporation has an interest and

to take any other action deemed by such President to be necessary to protect the interests of the Corporation in connection therewith.

- **3.4.8** Subject to the direction of the Executive Committee, the President may delegate any or all of the President's duties and powers to other officers or agents of the Corporation. The President shall perform such other duties and exercise such other powers as may be designated by the Trustees or the Executive Committee, and the President must live on the University Premises unless excused by the Board of Trustees.
- 3.5 THE PROVOST. The Provost of the University shall be responsible to the President for the academic administration of the University, and shall have such other duties as the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee may from time to time designate. Unless otherwise directed by the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee, the Provost shall, in the absence of or incapacity of the President, or in the event of a vacancy in the office of President, serve as Acting President and exercise the powers and duties of the President.
- **3.6** <u>VTCE PRESIDENTS</u>. Each of the Vice Presidents shall have such powers and duties as the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee on the **recommendation** of the President shall **from** time to time determine.

## 3.7 THE TREASURER.

3.7.1 Subject to the control and supervision of the Trustee Committee on Administration and Finance and the Executive Vice President, the Treasurer shall be responsible for the custody, administration, investment and management of the **funds** of the Corporation, and shall have available such records with respect to the assets of said funds as shall permit prompt and efficient management thereof. The Treasurer shall purchase, manage, sell or otherwise dispose of bonds, stocks, notes, real estate and other evidences of property, as authorized by the Committee. Subject to the control and supervision of the **Committee**, the Treasurer shall have the responsibility for the investment of all available uninvested cash

of the Corporation and shall make available **as** required the **funds** called for in the budget. The Treasurer shall have power to impress the corporate seal on all authorized documents requiring such seal.

3.7.2 The Treasurer shall, subject to the control of the Trustee Committee on Administration and Finance and the Executive Vice President, have the power to appoint any persons, including the Treasurer, as proxy or proxies of the Corporation and to vote at meetings of the stockholders of the corporations in which the

Corporation has an interest.

- 3.7.3 The Treasurer shall have the authority, with approval of the Trustees and the Executive Vice President or of the Trustee Committee on Administration and Finance and the Executive Vice President given generally or in a specific instance, to borrow for and on behalf of the Corporation and to sign in the name and on behalf of the Corporation agreements, notes and other instruments in connection therewith.
- **3.7.4** Persons whose titles include the word Treasurer shall discharge such duties as the President, Executive Vice President, the Treasurer or the Trustee Committee on Administration and Finance shall **from** time to time direct, and in the absence or incapacity of the Treasurer, they or any one of them may discharge, by direction of the President or the Committee, any or all duties of the Treasurer.
- 3.7.5 The Treasurer and persons whose titles include the word Treasurer shall give fidelity bonds in such sums and with such sureties as the Trustee Committee on Administration and Finance may require.

## 3.8 THE SECRETARY.

- **3.8.1** The Secretary shall be sworn to the **faithful** and impartial discharge of the duties of Secretary and shall record in books kept for the purpose all votes and proceedings of the Board of Trustees, the Executive Committee and the standing committees. The Secretary shall give notice of meetings of the Board, the Executive Committee and the standing committees; the Secretary shall keep and file all documents belonging to the Corporation committed to his or her custody. The Secretary shall have custody of the corporate seal and with it shall impress documents requiring a seal and attest them when necessary and shall perform such other duties as shall **from** time to time be directed by the President, the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee.
- **3.8.2** Assistant Secretaries shall **perform** such duties as the President, the Executive Committee or the Secretary shall direct and in the absence or disability of the Secretary one of the Assistant Secretaries may, by direction of the President or the Executive Committee, discharge any or all of the duties of the Secretary.

## **Article IV**

#### MEETINGS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

**4.1 REGULAR MEETINGS.** The Board of Trustees shall hold an annual

meeting for the election of officers and committees and the transaction of other business in October or November in each year, and two other regular meetings shall be held in each year, one in January or February and one in May or June, each on such day and at such time and place as may from time to time be determined by the Board or, if not so determined, by the President.

- 4.2 **SPECIAL MEETINGS.** Special meetings may be held at any time and at any place upon the call of the President, the Chairman of the Board, the Executive Committee or upon the written application to the Secretary or to any of the foregoing by at least five Trustees.
- **4.3 NOTICE OF MEETINGS.** A written notice of every meeting of the Board & Trustees shall be given by the Secretary or an Assistant Secretary, or in case of the death, absence, incapacity or refusal of the Secretary and Assistant Secretary by any other officer. The notice shall state the time, place and general purposes of the meeting, and shall be mailed to the address of each Trustee at least seven (7) days before the meeting. No notice of the time, place or purpose of any meeting shall be required if every Trustee who does not attend such meeting signs a written waiver of notice which is filed with the records of the meeting.
- 4.4 **OUORUM.** One-third of the Trustees then in **office** shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the Trustees, but a smaller number shall have power to adjourn from time to time.
- 4.5 **SPECIAL ACTION.** Any action required or permitted to be taken at any meeting of the Board of Trustees may be taken without a meeting if all the Trustees entitled to vote at such a meeting consent to the action in writing and the written consents are filed with the records of the meetings of the Board of Trustees. Such consents shall be treated for all purposes as a vote at a meeting.

#### **ARTICLE V**

## COMMITTEES AND BOARDS OF OVERSEERS

## 5.1 EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

5.1.1 There shall be an Executive Committee of not less than six nor more than nine Trustees, including the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, the Vice Chairmen, the President of the University and such other Trustees as shall be appointed at each annual meeting of the Board of Trustees by the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, subject to ratification by vote of the Board of Trustees. The

members of the Executive Committee shall serve for one year or until their successors shall be duly appointed. The number of Trustees to be appointed to the Executive Committee shall be fixed by the Board of Trustees at any annual meeting and when so fixed, shall continue until changed at a subsequent annual meeting. A majority of the number of Trustees so fixed as constituting the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum and the committee shall adopt such rules for the conduct of its business as it shall deem advisable.

- 5.1.2 In the intervals between meetings of the Board of Trustees, the Executive Committee shall have and exercise the authority of the Board in the management and execution of the affairs of the Corporation in all matters except those with respect to which authority is given in these Bylaws to the Trustee Committee on Administration and Finance and except those which pursuant to law or Sections 2.2.2, 2.3, 2.6, 2.7, **5.6.1.4,** 6.1, 9.1, 10.1, 11.2, 12.1 and 14.1 of these Bylaws require the vote of the Board of Trustees.
- 5.1.3 The Executive Committee shall have general oversight of the personnel policies of the University. The Executive Committee shall vote on behalf of the University all shares of capital stock owned by the University in subsidiary corporations of the University for the election of such persons as Directors of these corporations as the Executive Committee shall determine after receiving and considering the recommendations of the President of the University with respect thereto.

5.2 **STANDING COMMITTEES**. There shall be three standing committees as

follows:

Trustee Committee on Administration and Finance Trustee University Development Committee Trustee Academic Affairs Committee

5.2.1 Each standing committee shall consist of such number of Trustees, not less than three, including a Chairman of such committee and excluding ex officio members, as shall be determined from time to time by the Board of Trustees. The **Chairman** and the other members of each standing committee shall be elected by ballot at each annual meeting of the Board of **Trustees** and shall serve for one year or until their successors shall be duly elected and qualified. In addition to the

Trustees so elected, the President of the University shall be a member **ex officio** of each standing committee.

- 5.2.2 Three members of any standing committee shall constitute a quorum. Meetings of any standing committee shall be called by the Secretary whenever he or she is requested to do so by the chairman or vice chairman of the committee, the **chairman** of the Executive Committee or the President of the University, by giving notice of the time and place of meeting to each member of the committee.
- 5.2.3 Each standing committee shall appoint from among its own number a vice chairman of such committee and may appoint **from** time to time one or more subcommittees with such powers within the scope of the powers of such standing committee as are designated in the votes appointing them.
- 5.2.4 Records of the proceedings of each standing committee shall be kept by the Secretary and such proceedings shall be reported to the Board of Trustees. Each standing committee may adopt such rules for the conduct of its business as it shall deem advisable, except as otherwise provided in these Bylaws.

## 5.3 TRUSTEE COMMITTEE ON ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE.

5.3.1 **INVESTMENT AUTHORITY.** The Trustee Committee on Administration and Finance, in accordance with such investment policies and regulations as may be established from time to time by the Board of Trustees and subject to the general direction of the Board, shall be responsible for the investment, reinvestment and management of all assets of the Corporation other than institutional real estate. Purchases, sales, exchanges or other dispositions of bonds, stocks, and other property and assets and evidences of property and assets may be made or caused to be made by either the Committee or its Investment subcommittee, consisting of three or more persons appointed by the Committee from among its members. The Committee may consider and make recommendations to the Board of Trustees for the appointment of the Executive Vice President and for the appointment by the Board of independent investment advisors or managers authorized to invest and reinvest funds of the Corporation. The Committee shall seasonably review all investment transactions made by such independent advisors or managers and by the Investment subcommittee. It shall report such transactions from time to time to the Board of Trustees and shall take such other action in connection with the same as it shall deem necessary or appropriate, subject to the general direction of the Board of Trustees.

**5.3.2** REAL ESTATE. The Trustee Committee on Administration and

Finance may authorize the lease, sale, mortgage or conveyance of any real estate belonging to the Corporation and held for investment and not **as** part of the University plant, and may determine the terms and consideration therefor, and with respect to each instrument executed hereunder, a certificate of a vote of the Committee authorizing the same and reciting that the real estate affected thereby is held by the Corporation for investment and not **as** part of the university plant shall be conclusive evidence of the fact recited.

- **5.3.3 EVALUATIONS OF GIFTS**. The Trustee Committee on Administration and Finance shall authorize or approve at regular or special meetings the acceptance by the President or other **officer** at such values as it may **determine** of property tendered to the Corporation in payment of legacies, bequests or gifts.
- **5.3.4 RELEASE OF ASSIGNMENT OF SECURITY.** The Trustee Committee on Administration and Finance shall have the power to authorize the release of any or all property held by the Corporation **as** security for a loan, or the assignment of any secured loan owned by the Corporation.
- **5.3.5 BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS.** The Trustee Committee on Administration and Finance shall have the responsibility of considering and advising the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee with respect to the planning, expansion or development of buildings and grounds and the maintenance of such existing facilities and shall perform such other duties **as** the Board or the Executive Committee may from time to time designate. It shall report its activities and recommendations to either the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee.
- 5.4 TRUSTEE UNIVERSITY DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE. The Trustee University Development Committee shall have the responsibility of considering and advising the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee on current activities and future planning in the University's fund raising, public relations, federal, state, city and community relations, publications, alumni affairs, grants, contracts, patents, and licensing, and shall perform such other duties as the Board or the Executive Committee may from time to time designate. It shall report its activities and recommendations to either the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee. All capital fund raising plans shall be submitted to it for its consideration and advice.
- 5.5 TRUSTEE ACADEMIC AFFAIRS COMMITTEE. The Trustee Academic Affairs Committee shall have the responsibility of considering and advising the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee on current matters and future planning relating to curriculum, student affairs, faculty appointments requiring action of the Board of Trustees, emeritus appointments and relations with other educational institutions and shall perform such other duties as the Board or the Executive Committee may from time to time designate. It shall report its activities and recommendations to either the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee. The Committee shall

also make academic appointments as provided in Section 10.2 hereof.

## 5.6 OTHER COMMITTEES

## 5.6.1 **COMMITTEE ON TRUSTEESHIP.**

- **5.6.1.1** There shall be a Committee on Trusteeship consisting of not less than five Trustees including the Chairman of the Board of Trustees who shall be elected annually by the Board at its annual meeting to serve for one year or until their successors are elected. Any Trustee, except the Chairman of the Board, who has served on this Committee for three consecutive years, shall not be eligible for reelection to it for one year following the completion of said three consecutive years. Meetings shall be called in the manner provided in Section 5.2.2 and the provisions of Section 5.2.4 shall apply to the Committee on Trusteeship.
- **5.6.1.2** The Committee on Trusteeship shall nominate highly qualified and committed individuals to fill vacancies among the Charter Trustees and shall invite recommendations therefor **from** the entire University community. The Committee's nominations will be made in a confidential report to the Board of Trustees submitted at least three weeks prior to the date

of the meeting at which such Trustees are to be elected. The identity of such nominees shall not be disclosed until and unless authorized by the Board of Trustees.

- 5.6.1.3 The Committee on Trusteeship shall have the responsibility for ensuring that a program for the orientation of new Trustees is maintained and implemented. It shall periodically recommend to the Executive Committee initiatives by which the performance of the Board of Trustees shall be enhanced and assessed.
- 5.6.1.4 The Committee on Trusteeship shall consider and present to the Board of Trustees nominations for the officers, a chairman and other members of the Executive Committee, a chairman and other members of each standing committee to be elected at the annual meeting of the Trustees next following the appointment or election of such committee. All nominations for the officers other than the Chairman of the Board of Trustees, any Vice Chairman of the Board, President, Secretary and any Assistant Secretaries shall be made by the Committee on Trusteeship after receiving and

considering the recommendations of **the** President of the University with respect thereto.

- 5.6.1.5 The Chairman of the Board of Trustees shall present to the Board of Trustees nominations of members of the Committee on Trusteeship.
- 5.6.2 **HONORARY DEGREE COMMITTEE.** There shall be an Honorary Degree Committee consisting of not less than three Trustees who shall be elected annually by the Board at its annual meeting to serve for one year or until their successors are duly elected. The Honorary Degree Committee shall consider and present to the Board of Trustees recommendations of persons deemed worthy of being awarded an Honorary Degree from Tufts University. The Committee will invite nominations from the general Tufts community.

#### 5.6.3 COMPENSATION COMMITTEE

- 5.6.3.1 There shall be a Compensation Committee consisting of the Chairman of the Board and three additional Trustees who shall be elected annually by the Board at its annual meeting to serve for one year or until their successors are duly elected.
- 5.6.3.2 The Compensation Committee shall have the responsibility to ensure that, under the direction of the President, the ongoing development and periodic review of a system of job descriptions, job classifications, salary ranges, and performance reviews for the purpose of internal salary equity. In the case of the President, **he/she** and the Chairman of the Board will jointly agree upon **his/her** goals and objectives, and the Chairman will annually review the results with the President, then with the Compensation Committee, and **finally** with the Board of Trustees.
- 5.6.3.3 The Compensation Committee will periodically review the salary of the President and recommend changes to the Board of Trustees. The Compensation Committee will also periodically review the salary of employees that hold positions of significant management responsibility and consider changes proposed by the President. Meetings shall be called in the manner provided in Section 5.2.2 and the provision of Section 5.2.4 shall apply to the Compensation Committee.

#### 5.6.4 **AUDIT COMMITTEE.**

**5.6.4.1** There shall be an Audit Committee consisting of not less than three persons who shall be Trustees or Trustees Emeriti, provided that a majority thereof shall be Trustees. The **Chairman** and the other members of such Committee

shall be elected annually by the Board at its annual meeting to serve for one year or until their successors are duly elected. A majority of the members of such Committee shall constitute a quorum. Meetings shall be called in the manner provided in Section 5.2.2 and the provisions of Section 5.2.4 shall apply to the Audit Committee.

- 5.6.4.2 The Audit Committee shall have the responsibility of considering and advising the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee with respect to the Corporation's internal audit procedures, employment by the Board of independent certified public accounts, all matters in connection with independent audits and the formulation of policies or procedures for the avoidance of Trustee conflicts of interest and shall perform such other duties as the Board or the Executive Committee may from time to time determine. It shall report its activities and recommendations to either the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee.
- 5.6.5 **SPECIAL COMMITTEES.** Special Committees may be appointed by the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee, to serve for specific purposes and with powers as designated in the votes appointing them. Membership on such special committees shall not necessarily be limited to the Board of Trustees.
- **5.7** <u>VACANCIES</u>. Any vacancy at any time existing in the offices of **chairman** or member of a committee elected by the Board of Trustees may be filled by the Executive Committee and the person so elected to fill the vacancy shall hold office until the next annual meeting of the Board of Trustees or until such person's successor shall be duly elected and qualified.
- 5.8 <u>MEETING PARTICIPANTS</u>. Pursuant to vote of the Board of Trustees, non-voting participants from the faculty, the student body and the alumni may be invited to attend and participate in meetings of the Executive Committee and of the standing committees under procedures and regulations adopted **from** time to time by the Board of Trustees.
- **5.9 SPECIAL ACTION.** Any action required or permitted to be taken at any meeting of a committee may be taken without a meeting if all the members of the committee entitled to vote at such a meeting consent to the action in writing and the written consents are filed with the records of the meetings of the committee. Such consents shall be treated for all purposes **as** a vote at a meeting.
- 5.10 BOARDS OF OVERSEERS. Boards of Overseers may be appointed for the various schools, departments and functions of the University. Members of any such Boards of Overseers shall be appointed by the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee. It shall be the duty of each such Board of Overseers to advise and assist the school, department or function to which its appointment relates, and to advocate on its behalf. The Overseers should make needed

visits and reviews and report thereon to the Board of **Trustees** or the Executive Committee with such suggestions as it may deem desirable. Membership on such Board of Overseers shall not necessarily be limited to members of the Board of Trustees, but the Chairman of each such Board will be a Trustee or Trustee Emeritus.

## Article **VI**

#### **APPROPRIATIONS**

6.1 The Board of Trustees shall prior to the end of each academic year make appropriations required by the budget for the next year, and the Board may at any other meeting make additional appropriations for any purpose, provided that the matter of making such appropriations is included in the notice of the meeting. Appropriations of an emergency nature may be made by action of the Executive Committee.

#### Article VII

#### THE UNIVERSITY

7.1 The University shall include the following: School of Arts and Sciences, School of Engineering, School of Medicine, School of Dental Medicine, the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, College of Special Studies, School of Veterinary Medicine, **Sackler** School of Graduate Biomedical Sciences, and School of Nutrition Science and Policy. The School of Arts and Sciences shall consist of the College of Liberals Arts, Jackson College for Women, and the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences. The University shall include such other bodies as the Trustees may **from** time to time create, establish or rearrange.

## Article VIII

#### THE FACULTIES

8.1 <u>MEMBERSHIP</u>. Each college and **school** shall be under the immediate charge of its respective Faculty. Each such Faculty shall consist of such persons as shall be designated in the Bylaws of the Faculty of such college or school. There shall also be a Faculty of Arts, Sciences, and Engineering, composed of the Faculties of the School of Arts and Sciences, and the School of Engineering; all members of said Faculties shall be voting members of the Faculty of Arts, Sciences, and Engineering. The President of the University shall be the head of each Faculty.

- **8.2 SECRETARIES OF FACULTIES.** The various Faculties shall annually elect their own Secretaries, except that the Secretary of the Faculty of Arts, Sciences, and Engineering shall be the <u>ex officio</u> Secretary of several Faculties comprised in the Faculty of **Arts**, Sciences, and Engineering.
- **8.3 RESPONSIBILITY.** The respective faculties shall, subject to the limitations set forth in the Charter, have the oversight and control of the student body. The Faculties of **Arts**, Sciences, and Engineering of the College of Special Studies, of the School of Medicine, of the School of Dental Medicine, of the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, of the School of Veterinary Medicine, of the Sackler School of Graduate Biomedical Sciences, of the School of Nutrition Science and Policy and other colleges and schools heretofore or **hereafter** established, may accept or reject the application for admission of any student, may impose fines, inflict at their discretion the penalties of admonition, suspension and dismissal, and may use all other appropriate means of discipline. These powers may be exercised in the name and behalf of any of said Faculties by appropriate committees duly appointed and authorized by them, provided, however, that Faculty members always constitute a majority of any such committee.
- 8.4 **BYLAWS**. The provision of the bylaws of the respective Faculties concerning their membership, powers, duties and voting rights and the participation of students on their committees shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees.

#### Article IX

## THE DEANS

- 9.1 The Board of Trustees shall, upon recommendation **from** the President, appoint a Dean of the Faculty of Arts, Sciences, and Engineering, a Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Jackson College for the Humanities and Arts, a Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Jackson College for Natural Sciences and Social Sciences, a Dean of the School of Engineering, a Dean of the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences, a Dean of the School of Medicine, a Dean of the School of Dental Medicine, a Dean of the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, a Dean of the College of Special Studies, a Dean of the School of Veterinary Medicine, a Dean of the Sackler School of Graduate Biomedical Sciences and a Dean of the School of Nutrition Science and Policy or Dean for Nutrition Sciences, effective July **1**, **1995**.
- 9.2 The Vice President for Arts, Sciences, and Engineering shall be responsible to the Provost for the oversight of the School of Arts and Sciences, the School of Engineering and the College of Special Studies. The Dean of the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy and the Dean of the School of Nutrition Science and Policy or Dean for Nutrition Sciences, effective July 1, 1995, shall be responsible to the Provost for the oversight of the college or school of which he or she is Dean. The Vice President and each such Dean shall make **recommendations** to the Provost for appointments to the Faculty of each school or college of which he or she is responsible, prepare the

business for the meetings of each such Faculty, execute its orders and regulations, preside at its meetings in the absence of the President and the Provost, **make** an annual report to the President, and shall have such other duties, responsibilities and authority as may be delegated to such Vice President or Dean from time to **time** by the President. The Vice President for Arts, Sciences, and Engineering shall also prepare the business for the meetings of the Faculty of Arts, Sciences, and Engineering execute its orders and regulations, and preside at its meetings in the absence of the President and the Provost.

9.3. The Dean of the School of Medicine, the Dean of the School of Dental Medicine, the Dean of the School of Veterinary Medicine and the Dean of the Sackler School of Graduate Biomedical Sciences shall be responsible to the Provost for the oversight of the school of which he or she is Dean. Each such Dean shall make recommendations to the Provost for appointments to the Faculty of the School for which such Dean is responsible, prepare the business for the meetings of such Faculty, execute its orders and regulations, preside at its meetings in the absence of the President and Provost, make an annual report to the President and shall have such other duties, responsibilities and authority as may be delegated to such Dean **from** time to time by the President.

#### Article X

#### **ACADEMIC APPOINTMENTS**

10.1 <u>APPOINTMENTS BY BOARD OF TRUSTEES</u>. The Board of Trustees shall make all appointments with tenure, emeritus appointments and appointments of the University Chaplain, the University Librarian and the Deans specified in Section 9.1 of these Bylaws.

## 10.2 APPOINTMENTS BY TRUSTEE ACADEMIC AFFAIRS COMMITTEE.

The Trustee Academic Affairs Committee shall consider and make recommendations to the Board of Trustees regarding all appointments involving tenure, appointments to the University Professorships and Research Professorships, emeritus appointments and appointments of the University Chaplain, the University Librarian, the Deans specified in Section 9.1 of these Bylaws, and the Provost and the Vice President for Arts, Sciences, and Engineering. The Trustee Academic Affairs Committee shall make all appointments of full time Professors without tenure, department Chairmen and the Archivist.

10.3 <u>OTHER APPOINTMENTS</u>. All academic appointments without tenure of the rank of Associate Professor and below shall be made by the President of the University or such other persons as the President shall designate. The President of the University shall also make all appointments of Associate and Assistant Provosts, Deans other than those specified in Section 9.1 of these Bylaws and Associate and Assistant Deans and report such appointments to the Trustee Academic Affairs **Commi**ttee.

#### **Article XI**

#### ACADEMIC DEGREES

11.1 **REQUIREMENTS**. All degrees shall be conferred by vote of the Trustees. The ordinary degrees shall be conferred after recommendation of the appropriate Faculties, namely, of *Arts*, Sciences, and Engineering of the College of Special Studies, of the School of Medicine, of the School of Dental Medicine, of the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, of the School of Veterinary Medicine, of the Sackler Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences, of the School of Nutrition Science and Policy and of all other colleges and schools heretofore or **hereafter** established. No candidate of these degrees shall be recommended except after thorough examination, and academic residence at the University of at least one year. The requirement of residence may be waived for candidates for all degrees by vote of the appropriate Faculty and approved by the President of the University, All degrees conferred by the University shall be announced at Commencement.

11.2 **HONORARY DEGREES**. Honorary degrees may be **conferred** by a majority vote of the Board of Trustees upon such persons as may be recommended by the Honorary Degree Committee, or by unanimous vote of the Board of Trustees upon persons nominated by any Trustee.

#### **Article XII**

#### **INDEMNIFICATION**

12.1 TRUSTEES AND OFFICERS. (a) The Corporation shall **indemnify** to the maximum extent legally **permissible** but not to the extent that the status of the Corporation as an organization exempt under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code will be affected thereby, any person who was or is a party or is threatened to be made a party to any threatened, pending or completed action, suit or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative or investigative and whether external or internal to the Corporation, by reason of the fact that he or she is or was a Trustee or Officer of the Corporation or is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a trustee, director, officer, employee or other agent for another organization or in a capacity with respect to any employee benefit plan against expenses (including attorneys' fees), judgments, fines and amounts paid in settlement actually and reasonably incurred by him or her in connection with such suit, action or proceeding except with respect to any matter as to which he or she shall have been adjudicated in any proceeding not to have acted in good faith in the reasonable belief that his or her action was in the best interests of the Corporation or, to the extent that such matter relates to service with respect to an employee benefit plan, in the best interests of the participants or beneficiaries of such employee benefit plan. The termination of any action, suit or proceeding by judgment, order, settlement, conviction, or upon a plea of **nolo** contendere **or its** equivalent, shall not, of itself, create a presumption that the person did not act in the reasonable

belief that his or her action was in the best interests of the Corporation or, to the extent that such matter relates to service with respect to an employee benefit plan, in the best interests of the participants or beneficiaries of such employee benefit plan.

- (b) As to any matter disposed of by a compromise payment by such person, pursuant to a consent decree or otherwise, no indemnification under this Section 12.1 (unless required by law or ordered by a court) shall be made by the Corporation unless authorized in the specific case (i) by the Board of Trustees by a majority vote of a quorum consisting of Trustees who were not parties to such action, suit or proceeding, or (ii) if such a quorum is not obtainable, then by a majority vote of a committee of the Trustees consisting of all of the disinterested Trustees or (iii) if there are not two or more disinterested Trustees in office, then by a majority of the Trustees then in office provided they have obtained a written finding by special independent legal counsel appointed by a majority of the Trustees to the effect that, based upon a reasonable investigation of the facts as described in such opinion, the person to be indemnified appears to have acted in good faith in the reasonable belief that his or her action was in the best interests of the Corporation or, to the extent that such matter relates to service with respect to an employee benefit plan, in the best interests of the participants or beneficiaries of such employee benefit plan.
- (c) Notwithstanding anything in this Section 12.1 to the contrary, no indemnification shall be provided for any person with respect to any matter as to which he or she shall have been adjudicated in any proceeding not to have acted in good faith in the reasonable belief that his or her action was in the best interests of the Corporation or, to the extent that such matter relates to service with respect to an employee benefit plan, in the best interests of the participants or beneficiaries of such employee benefit plan.
- (d) Expenses incurred by a Trustee or **Officer** in defending a civil or criminal action, suit or proceeding shall be paid by the Corporation in advance of the final disposition of such action, suit or proceeding upon receipt of an undertaking by or on behalf of the Trustee or Officer to repay such amount if it shall ultimately be determined that he or she is not entitled to be indemnified by the Corporation as authorized in this Section 12.1. Such undertaking shall be accepted by the Corporation without reference to the financial ability of the person giving the undertaking to make repayment. Any advance under this subsection (d) shall be made promptly, and in any event within ninety (90) days, upon the written request of the person seeking the advance.
- (e) The indemnification and advancement of expenses provided by, or granted to, the other subsections of this Section **12.1** shall not be deemed exclusive of or affect any other rights to which any person may be entitled by contract or otherwise under law. Each person who is or becomes a Trustee or Officer shall be deemed to have served or have continued to serve in such capacity and in such other capacity at the request of the Corporation as described in subsection (a) in reliance upon the indemnity provided for in this Section **12.1**. All rights to **indemnification** under this Section 12.1 shall be deemed to be provided by a contract between the Corporation and the person who serves as Trustee or Officer of the Corporation. Any repeal or modification of this

Section 12.1 shall not affect any rights or obligations then existing.

- (f) To the extent that a Trustee or Officer of the Corporation has been successful on the merits or otherwise in defense of any action, suit or proceeding referred to in subsection (a), or in defense of any claim, issue or matter therein, he or she shall be indemnified against expenses (including attorneys' fees) actually and reasonably incurred by him or her in connection therewith.
- (g) The indemnification and advancement of expenses provided by, or granted pursuant to, this Section 12.1 shall continue as to a person who has ceased to be a Trustee or Officer and shall inure to the benefit of the heirs, executors and administrators of such a person.
- (h) If any term or provision of this Section 12.1 or the application thereof to any person, property or circumstance shall to any extent be invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this Section 12.1 or the application of such term or provision to the persons, property or circumstances other than those as to which it is invalid or unenforceable shall not be affected thereby, and each term and provision of this Section 12.1 shall be valid and enforced to the fullest extent permitted by law.
- **12.2 FACULTY MEMBERS AND OTHER EMPLOYEES.** Individuals who are members of the Faculties of the several colleges and schools and other employees and agents of the Corporation who are not Trustees or Officersshall be indemnified by the Corporation to the extent from time to time authorized by the Board of Trustees.

## **Article XIII**

#### TRUSTEE CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

## 13.1 CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

- **13.1.1** In keeping with the University's high ethical standards, Trustees shall exercise care that no detriment to the University results from conflicts between their interests and those of the University. Trustees shall be sensitive to potential conflicts of interest or the appearance of conflicts of interest even if no actual conflicts exist.
- 13.1.2 But for the exceptions described below, the University will not enter into any transaction in which a Trustee, or persons or entitles closely associated\* to that Trustee, have a material financial interest, direct or indirect, or because of which a Trustee's independence of judgment might be impaired. Exceptions to this principle are transactions:

- (a) approved by a majority of the Executive Committee. If a majority of the Executive Committee is disqualified from acting or if a majority of it so votes, then approval by a majority of the Full Board shall be required; or
- (b) involving competitive bids or standard rates and terms offered to business generally.

## "Closely associated" means:

- (i) A spouse, parent, sibling, child, person living in the household or business associate of the Trustee.
- (ii) Any entity which is directly or indirectly owned or controlled individually or collectively by you **and/or** by persons described in (1) above. For this purpose, "owned" means holding more than 35 percent of voting membership rights or voting stock in the entity; **"controlled"** means comprising over 35 percent of the directors, trustees or other members of the governing body of the entity.
- (iii) A law firm, accounting firm or other partnership of which you are or a person described in (i) above is a partner.

- 13.1.3 Trustees who believe a potential transaction with the University may involve a conflict must report that transaction and all material facts in writing to the Executive Committee in sufficient time for the Executive Committee to approve or disapprove unless the transaction is covered by 13.1.2 (b) above.
- 13.1.4 When a conflict is under consideration pursuant to 13.1.2 (a) above, no involved Trustee may be present for the discussion or vote. Approval shall be based on a finding that the transaction is fair to the University, that it appears that the University cannot obtain a more advantageous arrangement with reasonable effort, and that the transaction will not constitute an excess benefit under Section 4958 of the Internal Revenue Code.
- **13.1.5** Annually, each Trustee will sign a statement provided by the University that **he/she** has read and understands this policy and agrees to comply with it. The Trustee will also disclose on that statement information relating to potential conflicts of interest.

- 13.1.6 The Executive Committee shall review all such statements with a view to minimizing the potential for any detrimental effects **from** conflicts and excess benefits under Section 4958 of the Internal Revenue Code. A report of all conflicts voted on during the preceding year or reported by Trustees shall be forwarded to the Board of Trustees by the Executive Committee with a statement of applicable exceptions for each conflict or of a finding **of** no conflict.
- **13.2. <u>DETERMINATION OF QUORUM.</u>** An involved Trustee may be counted in determining the presence of a quorum at a meeting of the Executive Committee or the Board of Trustees.

#### **Article XIV**

## **AMENDMENTS OF BYLAWS**

14.1 These Bylaws may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the Trustees present at any meeting of the Trustees, provided that notice of the substance of the intended amendment is given not less than thirty(30) days prior to the meeting.

## BYLAWS OF TRUSTEES OF TUFTS COLLEGE

#### Article I

#### THE CORPORATION

1.1 The legal corporate name of the Corporation is TRUSTEES OF TUFTS COLLEGE, under which name the management and execution of its business affairs are conducted. The name TUFTS UNIVERSITY is to be employed when referring to the institution in its entirety and inclusive of its undergraduate, graduate and professional schools and other activities of the institution as a whole.

#### Article Π

#### THE TRUSTEES

## **2.1** <u>AUTHORITY. RESPONSIBILITY AND NUMBER.</u>

- AUTHORITY **AND** RESPONSIBILITY. 2.1.1.1 The Board of Trustees shall have the authority to carry out all lawful functions that are **permitted** by these Bylaws or by the Restated Articles of Organization. This authority shall include but shall not be limited to the following: (a) periodically review and approve the University's mission and purposes; (b) appoint the President who shall be the University's chief executive officer, and set appropriate conditions of employment, including compensation; (c) establish the conditions of employment of other key institutional officers; (d) support the President and assess his or her performance; (e) review and approve proposed major changes in the University's academic programs and other major enterprises consistent with the University's mission, plans and financial resources; (f) approve institutional policies bearing on faculty appointment, promotion, tenure and dismissal; (g) approve the annual budget and annual tuition/fees; (h) regularly monitor the University's financial condition, and establish policy guidelines affecting all institutional assets including investments and the physical plant; (i) contribute financially to the University's fundraising goals and participate actively in strategies to secure sources of support; (i) approve all earned and honorary degrees; (k) periodically undertake or authorize assessments of the Board's performance.
- **2.1.1.2** The Board of Trustees may delegate any of its authority or responsibility to any committee established by Article V, subject to the provisions of these Bylaws.

- **2.1.2 NUMBER.** The Board of Trustees shall consist of not less than **twenty**-eight nor more than forty-one members.
- **22 CLASSES.** The members of the Board shall be classified as follows:
- **2.2.1** CHARTER TRUSTEES. Thirty in number, to be elected by the Board to serve for terms of five years that expire at the annual meeting of the Board. Any Trustee whose term extends beyond the date when such Trustee attains the age of seventy-five years except as provided in Section 2.3.5, will serve only until the annual meeting that coincides in date with or next follows the date of such attainment. At any election of Trustees, there may be elected up to the maximum number of Charter Trustees permitted under the foregoing provision. The term of any Charter Trustee elected prior to November 1, 1999 shall not be affected by this Section.
- 2.2.2 <u>ALUMNI TRUSTEES</u>. Ten in number, to be elected by ballot by and from the alumni, to serve for terms of five years, such service to begin with the annual meeting of the Board of Trustees following the election. The term "alumni" as used in this Article II shall be deemed to include (a) each person who has received a degree from the University or from the Eliot-Pearson School or the Boston School of Occupational Therapy prior to the affiliation of said schools with the University and (b) each non degree-holding former student of the University who has pursued an approved course of study in the University for at least one academic year, provided that the prescribed period for completion of said course of study shall have passed. The term of any Alumni Trustee elected prior to November 1, 1999, shall not be affected by this Section.
- **2.2.3 TRUSTEE EX OFFICIO.** The President of the University during such President's term of office shall serve **ex** officio with **full** voting rights.

## **2.3** ELECTION OF CHARTER TRUSTEES.

2.3.1 The Charter Trustees shall be elected by majority vote of the members of the Board of Trustees present and voting. Their election need not be by ballot but may be by ballot if requested by three or more Trustees present. If the election is by ballot, it shall be conducted in accordance with the following provisions. On the first ballot each Trustee voting shall enter on the ballot the name of no more than two nominees (or one if only one Charter **Trustee** of the class is to be elected) for election as Charter **Trustees** of the particular class and the name of any nominee no more than once on any ballot, and shall submit the ballot to one of the tellers appointed by the Chair. The tellers will tally and report to the Chair the total number of ballots cast and the number of votes cast for each nominee. A nominee receiving votes equal to or exceeding in number a majority of the ballots cast shall be declared elected. If no nominee, or only one nominee is elected, succeeding ballots shall be taken in the same manner as the first, except that voting shall be for only one nominee if the first ballot resulted in the election of one member. On the second and succeeding ballots, the nominee having the smallest number of votes in the next preceding ballot shall be excluded from consideration.

- **2.3.2** The Board of Trustees may by majority vote designate one or more persons as alternates to a person elected to the office of Charter Trustee, and in the event that the person so elected shall decline to accept his or her election, the first of such alternates in the order designated by the Board who is willing to act in such office shall, upon his or her acceptance thereof, be deemed to be elected to said office. Voting with respect to the designation of such alternates shall be conducted in a manner similar to that provided in section 2.3.1 for the election of Charter Trustees.
- **2.3.3** Any Charter Trustee who has served a ten- year term or consecutive terms totaling ten or more years shall not be eligible for reelection for a term commencing earlier than a year after the completion of such years of service. This subsection shall not apply in the case of a Chair or Vice Chairs in office, provided, however, that they shall only be eligible for reelection on a year-to-year basis. There shall be no more than three Vice Chairs in **office**.
- **2.3.4** Any vacancy in the office of Charter Trustee may be filled by vote of the Board at any annual, regular or special meeting of the Board.
- **2.3.5** The Board of Trustees may in particular instances upon recommendation of the Committee on Trusteeship and by majority vote make exceptions to the qualifications as to age of any elected Charter Trustee or individual proposed for election as Charter Trustee, provided that at no time will there be more than five Trustees over age **seventy**-five; and further provided that such exceptions will be made to fill a vacancy for the balance of any existing term.
- **24** ELECTION OF ALUMNI TRUSTEES. Alumni Trustees shall be elected by ballot by the alumni, such election to be conducted each year in accordance with rules and procedures adopted by the Alumni Council as the governing board of the **Tufts** University Alumni Association, Inc. and approved by the Board. Any vacancy in the office of Alumni Trustee shall be filled for the unexpired term by an election by ballot of the alumni conducted as aforesaid, provided, however, that if such vacancy occurs within one year prior to the expiration of the term, it need not be filled prior to such expiration.
- **2.5** <u>RESIGNATIONS</u>. Any Charter Trustee, Alumni Trustee or Trustee Emeritus may resign by notice in writing to the Secretary.

#### **2.6 TRUSTEES EMERITI.**

**2.6.1** Any Charter or Alumni Trustee may be elected by the Board as a Trustee Emeritus, subject to the following conditions: (a) at least one year but not more than six years have elapsed since the expiration of **his/her** term or resignation; (b) **he/she** served as a Trustee for at least five years; and (c) **he/she** is nominated by the Executive Committee.

- **262** Each year the Executive Committee will consider those persons who meet the requirements of 2.6.1 (a) and (b). The Executive Committee will nominate those who, in its opinion, provided leadership and service to the University above and beyond that normally expected of a Trustee.
- **2.6.3** Trustees Emeriti shall be entitled to receive notice of each meeting of the Board and may attend and participate with the Trustees in the meetings of the Board and at public academic occasions, but shall not be members of the Board and shall not have the privilege of voting or of holding any office (other than membership in the Investment Subcommittee, as provided in Section 5.2.1) which is to be filled by election or appointment **from** among the members of the Board. They shall not be counted in determining the number of Trustees required to constitute a quorum or in determining the presence of a quorum; they may serve on committees of the Board where membership is not required.
- **2.7 REMOVAL.** The Board, by a two-thirds vote of all its members after giving the Trustee at least thirty days' notice and an opportunity to be heard shall have the power to remove any Charter or Alumni Trustee who shall be, in the judgment of the Board, disqualified for cause or permanently incapacitated from performing duties as Trustee.
- **2.8 <u>DISOUALIFICATION OF STAFF.</u>** An acceptance of the office of Trustee by any person other than the President of the University shall be deemed a resignation from any office or position held on the educational or administrative staff in any of the departments of the University. Acceptance by a Trustee, other than the President, of any **office** or position on the educational or administrative staff in any of the departments of the University shall be deemed to be a resignation as a Trustee.

#### **Article III**

#### THE OFFICERS OF THE CORPORATION

- **3.1 THE OFFICERS.** The Officers of the Corporation shall be the Chair of the Board of Trustees, up to three Vice **Chairs**, the President of the University, the Treasurer and **the** Secretary, all of whom shall be elected at the annual meeting of the Trustees and shall hold office for one year or until their successors shall be duly elected and qualified, the Provost, the Executive Vice President, the Vice President for University Advancement, the Vice President for University Relations, and other officers, including without limitation those having titles that include the words "President," "Vice President," "Treasurer" or "Secretary," as the Board may **from** time to time elect or appoint, who shall serve at the will of the Board of Trustees.
  - **3.2.1** <u>VACANCIES</u>. Any vacancy in any such **office** may be filled by the Executive Committee upon the recommendation of the President and the person so elected to fill the vacancy shall hold office until the next annual meeting or until his or her successor shall be duly elected and qualified.

- **3.2.2** <u>NEW POSITIONS.</u> In the intervals between meetings of the Board of Trustees, the Executive Committee may, upon the recommendation of the President, create and fill any position having a title that includes the words "Vice President", "Treasurer", or "Secretary". The person so elected shall serve at the will of the Board of Trustees.
- **3.2.3.** <u>SIGNATORY AUTHORITY</u>. The President shall have power to sign in the name and on behalf of the Corporation all duly authorized contracts, deeds and other instruments, including acceptances of gifts, bequests and devises to the University. Any such instrument may also be signed in the name and on behalf of the Corporation by any Vice President, the Chair of the Board or any other person designated for that purpose by the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee.
- **3.3** THE CHAIR. The Chair of the Board of Trustees shall preside at the meetings of the Board and in the absence or disability of the Chair a Vice Chair shall perform the Chair's duties.

#### 3.4 THE PRESIDENT.

- **3.4.1** The President of the University shall be both the leader of the educational policy and the chief executive officer of the University; the President shall exercise such leadership and supervision of its administrative officers, teachers, students, agents and employees as will promote the efficiency of each department and of the University as a whole, and the President shall exercise a general superintendence over all of its concerns.
- **3.4.2** The President shall act as the ordinary medium of communication between the Trustees and the faculties, student body and alumni organizations.
- **3.4.3** The President shall make an annual report to the Trustees on the general condition of the University.
- **3.4.4** The President shall be responsible for the management of current operating revenues and expenditures in connection with the educational, purchasing and plant activities of the Corporation, have charge of collection of income, insurance and taxes relating to institutional real estate and be responsible for the preparation of the annual budget and the establishment of an adequate system of budget control.
- **3.4.5** The President shall preside on public academic occasions; the President shall be President of the several Faculties.
- **3.4.6** Subject to such regulations, specific or general, as may be adopted **from** time to time **by** the Executive Committee, the President shall accept and give receipts for all gifts, devises and bequests to the Corporation, provided, however, that where a **gift**, devise or bequest is subject to a condition, the President may not bind the Corporation with respect to such condition without the approval of the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee, unless such condition is (a) that principal shall be retained and

only income or capital increment **be** expended, or (b) that such gift, devise or bequest be held by the University as trustee of a charitable remainder **unitrust** or annuity trust as defined in the Internal Revenue Code now in force or hereafter amended. Subject to such regulations as aforesaid, the President shall be responsible for all matters of probate and other legal matters in connection with gifts, devises, bequests, trust and annuity contracts and shall have the power to assent to accounts and other matters of probate in which the Corporation has an interest and to take any other action deemed by such President to be necessary to protect the interests of the Corporation in connection therewith.

- **3.4.7** Subject to the direction of the Executive Committee, the President may delegate any or all of the President's duties and powers to other officers or agents of the Corporation. The President shall perform such other duties and exercise such other powers as may be designated by the Trustees or the Executive Committee, and the President must live on the University premises unless excused by the Board of Trustees.
- **3.5 THE PROVOST.** The Provost of the University shall be responsible to the President for the academic administration of the University, and shall have such other duties as the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee may from time to time designate. Unless otherwise directed by the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee, the Provost shall, in the absence of or incapacity of the President, or in the event of a vacancy in the office of President, serve as Acting President and exercise the powers and duties of the President.
- **3.6** <u>VICE PRESIDENTS</u>. Each of the Vice Presidents shall have such powers and duties as the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee on the recommendation of the President shall from time to time determine.

#### 3.7 THE TREASURER.

- **3.7.1** Subject to the control and supervision of the Executive Vice President, the Treasurer shall be responsible for the custody of the funds of the Corporation, and shall have available such records with respect to the assets of said funds as shall permit prompt and efficient management thereof. The Treasurer shall have the responsibility for the investment of all available uninvested cash and all other non-investment assets of the Corporation and shall make available as required the funds called for in the budget. The Treasurer shall purchase, manage, sell or otherwise dispose of bonds, stocks, notes, real estate and other evidences of property comprising non-investment assets. The Treasurer shall have power to impress the corporate seal on all authorized documents requiring such seal.
- **3.7.2** The Treasurer shall have the authority, with approval of the Trustees and the Executive Vice President or of the Administration and Finance Committee and the Executive Vice President, to borrow for and on behalf of the Corporation and to sign in the name and on behalf of the Corporation agreements, notes and other instruments in connection therewith.

**3.7.3** Persons whose titles include the word Treasurer shall discharge such duties as the Treasurer shall from time to time direct, and in the absence or incapacity of the Treasurer, they or any one of them may discharge, by direction of the Executive Vice President, any or all duties of the Treasurer.

## 3.8 THE SECRETARY.

- **3.8.1** The Secretary shall be sworn to the faithful and impartial discharge of the duties of Secretary and shall record in books kept for the purpose all votes and proceedings of the Board of Trustees, the Executive Committee and the standing committees. The Secretary shall give notice of meetings of the Board, the Executive Committee and the standing committees; the Secretary shall keep and file all documents belonging to the Corporation committed to his or her custody. The Secretary shall have custody of the corporate seal and with it shall impress documents requiring a seal and attest them when necessary and shall **perform** such other duties as shall from time to time be directed by the President, the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee.
- **3.8.2** Assistant Secretaries shall **perform** such duties as the President, the Executive Committee or the Secretary shall direct and in the absence or disability of the Secretary one of the Assistant Secretaries may, by direction of the President or the Executive Committee, discharge any or all of the duties of the Secretary.

## Article IV

## MEETINGS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES

- **4.1 REGULAR MEETINGS.** The Board of Trustees shall hold an annual meeting for the election of officers and committees and the transaction of other business in October or November in each year, and two other regular meetings shall be held in each year, one in January or February and one in May or June, each on such day and at such time and place as may from time to time be determined by the Board or, if not so determined, by the President.
- **4.2** <u>SPECIAL MEETINGS.</u> Special meetings may be held at any time and at any place upon the call of the President, the Chair of the Board, the Executive Committee or upon the written application to the Secretary or to any of the foregoing by at least five Trustees.
- **4.3 NOTICE OF MEETINGS.** A written notice of every meeting of the Board of Trustees shall be given by the Secretary or an Assistant Secretary, or in case of the death, absence, incapacity or refusal of the Secretary and Assistant Secretary by any other officer. The notice shall state the time, place and general purposes of the meeting, and shall be mailed to the address of each Trustee at least seven (7) days before the meeting. No notice of the time, place or purpose of any meeting shall be required if every Trustee who does not attend such meeting signs a written waiver of notice which is filed with the records of the meeting.

- **4.4 QUORUM.** One-third of the Trustees then in office shall constitute a quorum at any meeting of the **Trustees**, but a smaller number shall have power to adjourn from time to time.
- **4.5 SPECIAL ACTION.** Any action required or permitted to betaken at any meeting of the Board of Trustees may be taken without a meeting if all the Trustees entitled to vote at such a meeting consent to the action in writing and the written consents are filed with the records of the meetings of the Board of Trustees. Such consents shall be treated for all purposes as a vote at a meeting.
- **4.6** <u>MEETINGS BY CONFERENCE TELEPHONE</u>. The Trustees or the members of any committee may participate in a meeting of the Trustees or such committee by means of a conference telephone or similar communications equipment by means of which all persons participating in the meeting can hear each other at the same time, and participation by such means shall constitute presence in person at a meeting.

#### **ARTICLE V**

#### COMMITTEES AND BOARDS OF OVERSEERS

## 5.1 EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

- 5.1.1 There shall be an Executive Committee of not less than six nor more than ten Trustees, including the Chair of the Board of Trustees, the Vice Chairs, the President of the University and such other Trustees as shall be appointed at each annual meeting of the Board of Trustees by the Chair of the Board of Trustees, subject to ratification by vote of the Board of Trustees. The members of the Executive Committee shall serve for one year or until their successors shall be duly appointed. The number of Trustees to be **appointed** to the Executive Committee shall be fixed by the Board of **Trustees** at **any** annual meeting and when so fixed, shall continue until changed at a subsequent annual **meeting.** A majority of the number of Trustees so fixed as constituting the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum and the committee shall adopt such rules for the conduct of its business as it shall deem advisable.
- 5.1.2 In the intervals between meetings of the Board of Trustees, the Executive Committee shall have and exercise the authority of the Board in the management and execution of the affairs of the Corporation in all matters except those with respect to which authority is given in these Bylaws to the Administration and Finance Committee and except those which pursuant to law or Sections 2.2.2, 2.3, 2.6, 2.7, 5.6.4, 11.1 and 13.1 of these Bylaws require the vote of the Board of Trustees.

**5.1.3** The Executive Committee shall have general oversight of the human resources policies of the University. The Executive Committee shall vote on behalf of the University all shares of capital stock owned by the University in subsidiary corporations of the University for the election of such persons as Directors of these corporations as the Executive Committee shall determine after receiving and considering the recommendations of the President of the University with respect thereto.

**5.2 STANDING COMMITTEES.** There shall be seven standing committees as follows:

Administration and Finance Committee Committee for University Advancement Academic Affairs Committee Committee on Trusteeship Honorary Degree Committee Compensation Committee Audit Committee

- **5.2.1** Each standing committee shall consist of such number of Trustees, not less than three, including a Chair of such committee and excluding **ex officio** members, as shall be determined **from** time to time by the Board of Trustees. Trustees Emeriti may be elected to the Investment Subcommittee by the Board of Trustees; provided, however, that a majority of the members of the subcommittee shall be current Trustees. The Chair, the members of each standing committee, and the members of the Investment and Buildings and Grounds Subcommittees shall be elected by ballot at each annual meeting of the Board of Trustees and shall serve for one year or until their successors shall be duly elected and qualified. In addition to the Trustees so elected, the President of the University shall be a member **ex officio** of each standing committee, provided that the President shall not serve as a member of the Audit Committee. With the exception of the President, **ex officio** members of committees shall not have the right to vote and shall not be counted for a quorum.
- **5.2.2** A majority of the members of any standing committee shall constitute a quorum. Meetings of any standing committee shall be called by the Secretary whenever he or she is requested to do so by the chair or vice chair of the committee, the chair of the Executive Committee or the President of the University, by giving notice of the time and place of meeting to each member of the committee.
- **5.2.3** Each standing committee may appoint from among its own number a vice chair of such committee and may appoint **from** time to time one or more subcommittees with such powers within the scope of the powers of such standing committee as are designated in the votes appointing them.

5.2.4 Records of the proceedings of each standing committee shall be kept by the Secretary and such proceedings shall be reported to the Board of **Trustees**. Each standing committee may adopt such rules for the conduct of its business as it shall deem advisable, except as otherwise provided in these Bylaws.

## 5.3 ADMINISTRATION AND FINANCE COMMITTEE

- **5.3.1.** The Administration and Finance Committee shall be responsible for considering and making recommendations to the Board of Trustees on matters pertaining to operating and capital budgets; tuitions, fees, and enrollments; and, upon the recommendation of the President, the appointment of the Executive Vice President. The Committee shall have the authority to approve the construction, renovation and maintenance of buildings and grounds; investment, reinvestment and **management** of all investment assets of the Corporation; and financing transactions.
- **5.3.2. BUDGETS.** The Administration and Finance Committee shall be responsible for the review and oversight of University operating and capital budgets. The Committee shall annually review and consider the University operating and capital budgets submitted by the President or his designate, and make recommendations to the Board of Trustees.
- **5.3.3. INVESTMENT AUTHORITY.** The Administration and Finance Committee, in accordance with such investment policies and regulations as may be established from time to time by the Board of Trustees and subject to the general direction of the Board, will oversee the operations of the Investment Subcommittee, consisting of three or more persons from among its members. Purchases, sales, exchanges or other dispositions of bonds, stocks, and other property and investment assets and evidences of investment property and assets may be made or caused to be made by either the Administration and Finance Committee or its Investment Subcommittee.
- Subcommittee shall be responsible for the investment, reinvestment and management of all investment assets of the Corporation, and for the appointment of independent investment advisors or managers authorized to invest and reinvest funds of the Corporation. - **5.3.1.** The Administration and Finance Committee shall be responsible for considering and making recommendations to the Board of Trustees on matters pertaining to operating and capital budgets; tuitions, fees, and enrollments; and, upon the recommendation of the President, the appointment of the Executive Vice President, The Committee shall have the authority to approve the construction, renovation and maintenance of buildings and grounds; investment, reinvestment and management of all investment assets of the Corporation; and financing transactions.
- **5.3.2.** <u>BUDGETS.</u> The Administration and Finance Committee shall be responsible for the review and oversight of University operating and capital budgets. managing the relationships with external investment managers and appointing and supervising internal investment staff.

- **5.3.4. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS.** The Administration and Finance Committee, in accordance with such policies and regulations as may be established from time to time by the Board of Trustees and subject to the general direction of the Board, shall oversee the operations of the Buildings and Grounds Subcommittee, consisting of two or more persons from among its members.
- **5.3.4.1. BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS SUBCOMMITTEE.** The Buildings and Grounds Subcommittee shall be responsible for considering and advising the Administration and Finance Committee with respect to the planning, expansion or development of buildings and grounds and the maintenance of such existing facilities.
- 5.4 <u>COMMITTEE FOR UNIVERSITY ADVANCEMENT</u>. The Committee for University Advancement shall have the responsibility of considering and advising the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee on current activities and **future** planning in the University's fund raising, public relations, federal, state, city and community relations, publications, and alumni relations. It shall report its activities and recommendations to either the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee. All capital fund raising plans shall be submitted to it for its consideration and advice.
- **5.5 ACADEMIC AFFAIRS COMMITTEE.** The Academic Affairs Committee shall be responsible for considering and making recommendations to the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee on appointments of Deans of the Schools specified in Section 8.1 and, upon recommendation of the President, the Provost. The Committee shall have authority to approve, on behalf of the Board of Trustees, new degree programs offered by individual Schools, jointly by two or more Schools within the University, and degree programs offered jointly with other institutions. The Committee shall also make academic appointments as provided in Section 9.2 hereof.

## 5.6 COMMITTEE ON TRUSTEESHIP.

- **5.6.1** There shall be a Committee on Trusteeship consisting of not less than five Trustees, including the Chair of the Board of Trustees. Any Trustee, except the Chair of the Board and the President, who has served on this Committee for three consecutive years, shall not be eligible for reelection to it for one year following the completion of said three consecutive years.
- **5.6.2** The Committee on Trusteeship shall nominate highly qualified and committed individuals to fill vacancies among the Charter Trustees and shall invite recommendations from the entire University community. The Committee's nominations will be made in a confidential report to the Board of Trustees submitted at least three weeks prior to the date of the meeting at which such Trustees are to be elected. The

identity of such nominees shall not be disclosed until and unless authorized by the Board of Trustees.

- **5.63** The Committee on Trusteeship shall have the responsibility for ensuring that a program for the orientation of new Trustees is maintained and implemented. It shall periodically recommend to the Executive Committee initiatives by which the performance of the Board of Trustees shall be enhanced and assessed.
- **5.6.4** The Committee on Trusteeship shall consider and present to the Board of Trustees nominations for the officers, a chair and other members of the Executive Committee, a chair and other members of each standing committee, and members of the Investment and Buildings and Grounds Subcommittees, to be elected at the annual meeting of the Trustees next following the appointment or election of such committee. All nominations for the **officers** other than the Chair of the Board of Trustees, any Vice Chairs of the Board, and President shall be made by the Committee on Trusteeship **after** receiving and considering the recommendations of the President of the University with respect thereto.
- **5.6.5** The Chair of the Board of Trustees shall present to the Board of Trustees nominations of members of the Committee on Trusteeship.
- **5.7 HONORARY DEGREE COMMITTEE.** The Honorary Degree Committee shall consider and present to the Board of Trustees recommendations of persons deemed worthy of being awarded an Honorary Degree **from** Tufts University. The Committee will invite nominations from the general Tufts community.

#### **5.8 COMPENSATION COMMITTEE**

- **5.8.1** The Chair of the Board shall serve on the Compensation Committee.
- **5.8.2** The Compensation Committee shall have the responsibility to ensure, under the direction of the President, the ongoing development and review of a system of job descriptions, job classifications, salary ranges, and performance reviews. The Compensation Committee shall have the responsibility for considering and advising the Board of Trustees on the University's systems and procedures for executive development. In the case of the President, **he/she** and the Chair of the Board will jointly agree upon **his/her** goals and objectives, and the Chair will annually review the results with the President, then with the Compensation Committee, and finally with the Board of Trustees.
- **5.8.3** The Compensation Committee will periodically review the salary of the President and recommend changes to the Board of Trustees. The President will not participate as a member of the Compensation Committee with respect to discussions or votes relating to the President's compensation. The Compensation Committee will also

periodically review the salary of employees who hold positions of significant management responsibility and consider changes proposed by the President.

- **5.9** AUDIT COMMITTEE. The Audit Committee shall be responsible for assisting the Board of Trustees in monitoring the integrity of the financial statements of the University, compliance by the University with legal and regulatory requirements, and the independence and performance of the University's internal and external auditors. The Audit Committee shall have authority to appoint the external auditors and retain special legal, accounting or other consultants to advise the Committee, oversee the Corporation's internal audit procedures, accept and approve the annual audited financial statements of the University, approve the appointment of and oversee the duties of the director of the internal audit and compliance functions, and oversee appropriate matters in connection with independent audits. The Audit Committee shall be responsible for the formulation of policies and procedures for the avoidance of Trustee conflicts of interest, and shall monitor potential conflicts of interest and periodically provide a report to the Board of Trustees, pursuant to Article XII. The Committee shall make regular reports to the Board on matters requiring its attention.
- **5.10 SPECIAL COMMITTEES.** Special Committees may be appointed by the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee, to serve for specific purposes and with powers as designated in the votes appointing them. Membership on such special committees shall not necessarily be limited to the Board of Trustees.
- **5.11 VACANCIES.** Any vacancy at any time existing in the offices of chair or member of a committee elected by the Board of Trustees may be filled by the Executive Committee and the person so elected to fill the vacancy shall hold office until the next annual meeting of the Board of Trustees or until such person's successor shall be duly elected and qualified.
- **5.12 MEETING REPRESENTATIVES.** Pursuant to vote of the Board of Trustees, non-voting representatives from the faculty, the student body and the alumni may be invited to attend and participate in meetings of the Executive Committee and of the standing committees under procedures and regulations adopted from time to time by the Board of Trustees.
- **5.13 SPECIAL ACTION.** Any action required or permitted to be taken at any meeting of a committee may be taken without a meeting if all the members of the committee entitled to vote at such a meeting consent to the action in writing and the written consents are filed with the records of the meetings of the committee. Such consents shall be treated for all purposes as a vote at a meeting.
- **5.14 BOARDS OF OVERSEERS.** Boards of Overseers may be appointed for the various schools, departments and functions of the University. Members of any such Boards of Overseers shall be appointed by the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee, except that a majority of the members of the Board of Overseers to the School of Veterinary Medicine shall be appointed by Cummings Foundation, Inc. (and which appointees shall not be employees of **Tufts** University). The Trustee Executive Committee shall accept the minutes of Boards of Overseers meetings. It shall be the duty of each such Board of Overseers to advise and assist the school, department or function to which its appointment relates, and to advocate on its behalf. The

Overseers should make needed visits and reviews and report thereon to the Board of Trustees or the Executive Committee with such suggestions as they may deem desirable. Membership on such Boards of Overseers shall not necessarily be limited to members of the Board of Trustees.

#### **Article VI**

#### THE UNIVERSITY

**6.1** The University shall include the following: School of Arts and Sciences, School of Engineering, School of Medicine, School of Dental Medicine, the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, College of Special Studies, Tisch College of Citizenship and Public Service, Cummings School of Veterinary Medicine, Sackler School of Graduate Biomedical Sciences, and The Gerald J. and Dorothy R. **Friedman** School of Nutrition Science and Policy. The School of Arts and Sciences shall consist of the College of Liberals Arts, Jackson College for Women, and the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences. The University shall include such other bodies as the Trustees may from time to time create, establish or rearrange.

#### **Article VII**

#### THE FACULTIES

- 7.1 <u>MEMBERSHIP</u>. Each college and school shall be under the immediate charge of its respective Faculty. Each such Faculty shall consist of such persons as shall be designated in the Bylaws of the Faculty of such college or school. There shall also be a Faculty of Arts, Sciences, and Engineering, composed of the Faculties of the School of Arts and Sciences and the School of Engineering; all members of said Faculties shall be voting members of the Faculty of Arts, Sciences, and Engineering. The President of the University shall be the head of each Faculty.
- 7.2 SECRETARIES OF FACULTIES. The various Faculties shall annually elect their own Secretaries, except that the Secretary of the Faculty of Arts, Sciences, and Engineering shall be the **ex** officio Secretary of several Faculties comprised in the Faculty of Arts, Sciences, and Engineering.
- 7.3 <u>RESPONSIBILITY</u>. The respective faculties shall, subject to the limitations set forth in the Charter, have the oversight and control of the student body. The Faculties of Arts, Sciences, and Engineering, the College of Special Studies, the Tisch College of Citizenship and Public Service, the School of Medicine, the School of Dental Medicine, the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, the Cummings School of Veterinary Medicine, the Sackler School of Graduate Biomedical Sciences, the Gerald J. and Dorothy R. Friedman School of Nutrition Science and Policy and other colleges and schools heretofore or hereafter established, may accept or reject the application for admission of any student, may impose fines, inflict at their

discretion the penalties of admonition, suspension and dismissal, and may use all other appropriate means of discipline. These powers may be exercised in the name and behalf of any of said Faculties by appropriate committees duly appointed and authorized by them, provided, however, that Faculty members always constitute a majority of any such committee.

**7.4 BYLAWS.** The provision of the bylaws of the respective Faculties concerning their membership, powers, duties and voting rights and the participation of students on their committees shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees.

## **Article VIII**

#### THE DEANS

- **8.1** The Board of Trustees shall, upon recommendation from the President, appoint a Dean of the School of Arts and Sciences, a Dean of the College of Liberal Arts and Jackson College, a Dean of the School of Engineering, a Dean of the Graduate School of Arts and Sciences, a Dean of the School of Medicine, a Dean of the School of Dental Medicine, a Dean of the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, a Dean of the College of Special Studies, a Dean of the Tisch College of Citizenship and Public Service, a Dean of the Cummings School of Veterinary Medicine, a Dean of the Sackler School of Graduate Biomedical Sciences and a Dean of the Gerald J. and Dorothy R. **Friedman** School of Nutrition Science and Policy.
- The Dean of the School of Arts and Sciences shall be responsible to the Provost for 8.2 the oversight of the School of Arts and Sciences and the College of Special Studies. The Dean of the School of Engineering, the Dean of the School of Medicine, the Dean of the School of Dental Medicine, the Dean of the Cummings School of Veterinary Medicine, the Dean of the Sackler School of Graduate Biomedical Sciences, the Dean of the Tisch College of Citizenship and Public Service, and the Dean of the Gerald J. And Dorothy R. Friedman School of Nutrition Science and Policy shall be responsible to the Provost for the oversight of the school of which he or she is Dean. Each such Dean shall make recommendations to the Provost for appointments to the Faculty of each school or college of which he or she is responsible, prepare the business for the meetings of each such Faculty, execute its orders and regulations, preside at its meetings in the absence of the President and the Provost, make an annual report to the President, and shall have such other duties, responsibilities and authority as may be delegated to such Dean from time to time by the President. The Deans of the School of Arts and Sciences and the School of Engineering shall also prepare the business for the meetings of the Faculty of Arts, Sciences, and Engineering, execute its orders and regulations, and preside at its meetings in the absence of the President and the Provost.

#### Article IX

#### ACADEMIC APPOINTMENTS

- **9.1** APPOINTMENTS BY BOARD OF TRUSTEES. The Board of Trustees shall appoint the Deans specified in Section 8.1 of these Bylaws.
- 9.2 APPOINTMENTS BY THE ACADEMIC AFFAIRS COMMITTEE. The Academic Affairs Committee shall consider and make recommendations to the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee regarding appointments of the Deans specified in Section 8.1 of these Bylaws, and, upon the recommendation of the President, appointment of the Provost. The Academic Affairs Committee shall have the authority to make all appointments involving tenure, full time appointments at the rank of Professor, emeritus appointments, and appointments of University Professors, the University Chaplain, and the University Archivist. The Committee shall have authority regarding the establishment of endowed professorships and the appointment of individuals as holders of such professorships.
- 9.3 OTHER APPOINTMENTS. All academic appointments without tenure of the rank of Associate Professor and below shall be made by the President of the University or such other persons as the President shall designate. The President of the University shall also make all appointments of Associate and Assistant Provosts, Deans other than those specified in Section 8.1 of these Bylaws, Associate and Assistant Deans, full-time research faculty, and department chairs and report such appointments to the Academic Affairs Committee.

#### Article X

#### **ACADEMIC DEGREES**

- 10.1 REQUIREMENTS. All degrees shall be conferred by vote of the Trustees. The ordinary degrees shall be conferred after recommendation of the appropriate Faculties, namely, of Arts, Sciences, and Engineering, of the College of Special Studies, of the School of Medicine, of the School of Dental Medicine, of the Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, of the Cummings School of Veterinary Medicine, of the Sackler Graduate School of Biomedical Sciences, of the Gerald J. and Dorothy R. Friedman School of Nutrition Science and Policy and of all other colleges and schools heretofore or hereafter established. No candidate of these degrees shall be recommended except after thorough examination, and academic residence at the University of at least one year. The requirement of residence may be waived for candidates for all degrees by vote of the appropriate Faculty and approved by the President of the University. All degrees conferred by the University shall be announced at Commencement.
- 10.2 <u>HONORARY DEGREES</u>. Honorary degrees may be conferred by a majority vote of the Board of Trustees upon such persons as may be recommended by the Honorary Degree Committee, or by unanimous vote of the Board of Trustees upon persons nominated by any Trustee.

#### Article XI

#### **INDEMNIFICATION**

- TRUSTEES AND OFFICERS. (a) The Corporation shall **indemnify** to the 11.1 maximum extent legally permissible but not to the extent that the status of the Corporation as an organization exempt under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code will be affected thereby, any person who was or is a party or is threatened to be made a party to any threatened, pending or completed action, suit or proceeding, whether civil, criminal, administrative or investigative and whether external or internal to the Corporation, by reason of the fact that he or she is or was a Trustee or Officer of the Corporation or is or was serving at the request of the Corporation as a trustee, director, officer, employee or other agent for another organization or in a capacity with respect to any employee benefit plan against expenses (including attorneys' fees), judgments, fines and amounts paid in settlement actually and reasonably incurred by him or her in connection with such suit, action or proceeding except with respect to any matter as to which he or she shall have been adjudicated in any proceeding not to have acted in good faith in the reasonable belief that his or her action was in the best interests of the Corporation or, to the extent that such matter relates to service with respect to an employee benefit plan, in the best interests of the participants or beneficiaries of such employee benefit plan. The termination of any action, suit or proceeding by judgment, order, settlement, conviction, or upon a plea of nolo contendere or its equivalent, shall not, of itself, create a presumption that the person did not act in the reasonable belief that his or her action was in the best interests of the Corporation or, to the extent that such matter relates to service with respect to an employee benefit plan, in the best interests of the participants or beneficiaries of such employee benefit plan.
- (b) As to any matter disposed of by a compromise payment by such person, pursuant to a consent decree or otherwise, no indemnification under this Section 11.1 (unless required by law or ordered by a court) shall be made by the Corporation unless authorized in the specific case (i) by the Board of Trustees by a majority vote of a quorum consisting of Trustees who were not parties to such action, suit or proceeding, or (ii) if such a quorum is not obtainable, then by a majority vote of a committee of the Trustees consisting of all of the disinterested Trustees or (iii) if there are not two or more disinterested Trustees in office, then by a majority of the Trustees then in office provided they have obtained a written finding by special independent legal counsel appointed by a majority of the Trustees to the effect that, based upon a reasonable investigation of the facts as described in such opinion, the person to be indemnified appears to have acted in good faith in the reasonable belief that his or her action was in the best interests of the Corporation or, to the extent that such matter relates to service with respect to an employee benefit plan, in the best interests of the participants or beneficiaries of such employee benefit plan.
- (c) Notwithstanding anything in this Section 11.1 to the contrary, no indemnification shall be provided for any person with respect to any matter as to which he or she shall have been adjudicated in any proceeding not to have acted in good faith in the reasonable

**11.2 FACULTY MEMBERS AND OTHER EMPLOYEES.** Individuals who are members of the Faculties of the several colleges and schools and other employees and agents of the Corporation who are not Trustees or **Officers** shall be indemnified by the Corporation to the extent from time to time authorized by the Board of Trustees.

#### Article XII

## TRUSTEE CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

# 12.1 CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

- **12.1.1** In keeping with the University's high ethical standards, Trustees shall exercise care that no detriment to the University results from conflicts between their interests and those of the University. Trustees **shall** be sensitive to potential conflicts of interest or the appearance of conflicts of interest even if no actual conflicts exist.
- **12.1.2** But for the exceptions described below, the University will not enter into any transaction in which a Trustee, or persons or entities closely associated\* to that Trustee, have a material financial interest, direct or indirect, or because of which a Trustee's independence of judgment might be impaired. Exceptions to this principle are transactions:
  - (a) approved by a majority of the Audit Committee. If a majority of the Audit Committee is disqualified from acting or if a majority of the Audit Committee elects to refer the matter to the Executive Committee, then approval by a majority of the Executive Committee **shall** be required; or
  - (b) involving competitive bids or standard **rates** and terms offered to business generally.
- **12.1.3** Trustees who believe a potential **transaction** with the University may involve a conflict must report that transaction and all material facts in writing to the Audit Committee in sufficient time for the Audit Committee to approve or disapprove.

## "Closely associated" means:

- (i) A spouse, parent, sibling, child, person living in the household or business associate of the Trustee.
- (ii) Any entity which is directly or indirectly owned or controlled individually or collectively by you **and/or** by persons described in (1) above. For this purpose. "owned" means holding more than **35** percent of voting membership rights or voting stock in the entity; "controlled" means comprising over **35** percent of the directors, trustees or other members of the governing body of the entity.

- (c) Notwithstanding anything in (his Section 11.1 to the contrary, no indemnification shall be provided for any person with respect to any matter as to which he or she **shall** have been adjudicated in any proceeding not to have acted in good faith in the **reasonable** belief that his or her action was in the best interests of the Corporation or, to the extent that such matter relates to service with respect to an employee benefit plan, in the best interests of the participants or beneficiaries of such employee benefit plan.
- (d) Expenses incurred by a Trustee or **Officer** in defending a civil or criminal action, suit or proceeding shall be paid by the Corporation in advance of the final disposition of such action, suit or proceeding upon receipt of an undertaking by or on behalf of the Trustee or **Officer** to repay such amount if it shall ultimately be determined that he or she is not entitled to be indemnified by the Corporation as authorized in this Section 11.1. Such **undertaking** shall be accepted by the Corporation without reference to the financial ability of the person giving the undertaking to make repayment. Any advance under this subsection (d) shall be made promptly, and in any event within ninety (90) days, upon the written request of the person seeking the advance.
- (e) The indemnification and advancement of expenses provided by, or granted to, the other subsections of this Section 11.1 shall not be deemed exclusive of or affect any other rights to which any person may be entitled by contract or otherwise under law. Each person who is or becomes a Trustee or Officer shall be deemed to have served or have continued to serve in such **capacity** and in such other capacity at the request of the Corporation as described in subsection (a) in reliance upon the indemnity provided for in this Section 11.1. All rights to indemnification under this Section 11.1 shall be deemed to be provided by a contract between the Corporation and the person who serves as Trustee or Officer of the **Corporation**. Any **repeal** or modification of this Section 11.1 shall not affect any rights or obligations then existing.
- To the extent that a Trustee or **Officer** of the Corporation has been **successful** on the merits or **otherwise** in defense of any action, suit or proceeding referred to in subsection (a), or in defense of any claim, issue or matter therein, he or she **shall** be indemnified against expenses (including attorneys' fees) actually and reasonably incurred by him or her in connection therewith.
- (g) The indemnification and advancement of expenses provided by, or **granted** pursuant to, this Section 11.1 shall continue as to a person who has ceased to be **a** Trustee or **Officer** and shall inure to the benefit of the heirs, executors and **administrators** of such a person.
- (h) If any term or provision of this Section 11.1 or the application thereof to any person, property or circumstance shall to any extent be invalid or unenforceable, the remainder of this Section 11.1 or the application of such term or provision to the persons, **property** or **circumstances** other than those as to which it is invalid or unenforceable shall not be affected thereby, and each term and provision of this Section 11.1 shall be valid and enforced to the fullest extent permitted by law.

(iii) A law firm, accounting firm or other partnership of which you arc or a person described in (i) above is a partner.

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- 12.1.4 When a conflict is under consideration pursuant to 12.1.2 (a) above, no interested Trustee may be present for the discussion or vote. Approval shall be based on a finding that the **transaction** is fair to the University, that it appears that the University **cannot** obtain a more advantageous arrangement with reasonable effort, and that the transaction will not constitute an excess benefit under Section **4958** of the Internal Revenue Code.
- 12.15 Annually, each Trustee will sign a statement provided by the University that **he/she has** read and understands this policy and agrees to comply with it. The Trustee will also disclose on that statement information relating to potential conflicts of interest.
- 12.1.6 The Audit Committee shall review all such statements with a view to minimizing the potential for any detrimental effects from conflicts and excess benefits under Section 4958 of the Internal Revenue Code. A report of all conflicts voted on during the preceding year or reported by Trustees shall be forwarded to the Board of Trustees by the Audit Committee with a statement of applicable exceptions for each conflict or of a finding of no conflict.
- **12.2** . <u>DETERMINATION OF QUORUM</u>. An interested Trustee may be counted in **determining** the presence of a quorum at a meeting of the Audit Committee or the Board of Trustees.

## Article XIII

## AMENDMENTS OF BYLAWS

**13.1** These Bylaws may be amended by a vote of two-thirds of the Trustees present at any meeting of the Trustees, provided that notice of the substance of the intended amendment is given not less than thirty (30) days prior to the meeting.

# INTRODUCTION

This Manual is published by the Federal Communications Commission (the "FCC" or the "Commission"), the federal agency directed by Congress to regulate broadcasting. It provides a brief overview of the FCC's regulation of broadcast radio and television licensees, describing how the FCC authorizes broadcast stations, the various rules relating to broadcast programming and operations with which stations must comply, and the essential obligation of licensees that their stations serve their local communities. The Manual also outlines how you can become involved in assessing whether your local stations are complying with the FCC's rules and meeting these service obligations, and what you can do if you believe that they are not.

In exchange for obtaining a valuable license to operate a broadcast station using the public airwaves, each radio and television licensee is required by law to operate its station in the "public interest, convenience and necessity." This means that it must air programming that is responsive to the needs and problems of its local community of license.

To do so, each station licensee must affirmatively identify those needs and problems and then specifically treat those local matters that it deems to be significant in the news, public affairs, political and other programming that it airs. As discussed at page 29 of this Manual, each station must provide the public with

information about how it has met this obligation by means of quarterly reports, which contain a listing of the programming that it has aired that the licensee believes provided significant treatment of issues facing the community. As discussed in detail at pages 25-31 of this Manual, each station also must maintain and make available to any member of the public for inspection, generally at its studio, a local public inspection file which contains these reports, as well as other materials that pertain to the station's operations and dealings with the FCC and with the community that it is licensed to serve. The public file is an excellent resource to gauge a station's performance of its obligations as a Commission licensee. In the future, television stations with websites will be required to post most of the content of their public files on their websites, or on the website of their state local broadcasters association, if permitted.

The purpose of this Manual is to provide you with the basic tools necessary to ensure that the stations that are licensed to serve you meet their obligations and provide high quality broadcast service. Station licensees, as the trustees of the public's airwaves, must use the broadcast medium to serve the public interest. We at the FCC want you to become involved, if you have any concerns about a local station – including its general operation, programming or other matters – by making your opinion known to the licensee and, if necessary, by advising us of those concerns so that we can take appropriate action. An informed and actively engaged public plays a vital role in helping each station to operate appropriately and serve the needs of its local community.

This Manual provides only a general overview of our broadcast regulation. It is not intended to be a comprehensive or controlling statement of the broadcast rules and policies. Our Internet home page (www.fcc.gov) contains additional information about the Commission, our rules, current FCC proceedings, and other issues. At the close of each section of this Manual, we provide links to those places on the FCC website that provide additional information about the subject matter discussed in the section. Although we will periodically update this Manual and maintain the current version on the FCC website at <a href="https://www.fcc.gov/mb/audio/decdoc/public\_and\_broadcasting.html">www.fcc.gov/mb/audio/decdoc/public\_and\_broadcasting.html</a>, we urge you to also make use of the resources contained in these links, which may outline any more recent developments in the law not discussed in the current version of the Manual. # THE FCC AND ITS REGULATORY AUTHORITY

The Communications Act. The FCC was created by Congress in the Communications Act for the purpose of "regulating interstate and foreign commerce in communication by wire and radio so as to make available, so far as possible, to all the people of the United States, without discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, or sex, a rapid, efficient, Nation•wide, and world•wide wire and radio communications service . . . ." (In this context, the word "radio" covers both broadcast radio and television.) The Communications Act authorizes the FCC to "make such regulations not inconsistent with law as it may deem necessary to prevent interference between stations and to carry out the provisions of [the] Act." It directs us to base our broadcast licensing decisions on the determination of whether those actions will serve the public interest, convenience, and necessity.

How the FCC Adopts Rules. As is the case with most other federal agencies, the FCC generally cannot adopt or change rules without first describing or publishing the proposed rules and seeking comment on them from the public. We release a document called a Notice of Proposed Rule Making, in which we explain the new rules or rule changes that we are proposing and establish a filing deadline for public comment on them. (All such FCC Notices are included in the Commission's Daily Digest and are posted on our website at <a href="http://www.fcc.gov/Daily\_Releases/Daily\_Digest">http://www.fcc.gov/Daily\_Releases/Daily\_Digest</a>). After we have had a chance to hear from the public and have considered all comments received, we generally have several options. We can: (1) adopt some or all of the proposed rules, (2) adopt a modified version of some or all of the proposed rules, (3) ask for public comment on additional issues relating to the proposals, or (4) end the rulemaking proceeding without adopting any rules at all. The site also provides instructions on how you can file comments electronically. In addition to adopting rules, we also establish broadcast regulatory policies through the individual cases that we decide, such as those involving license renewals, station sales, and complaints about violations of FCC rules.

The FCC and the Media Bureau. The FCC has five Commissioners, each of whom is appointed by the President and confirmed by the Senate. Serving under the Commissioners are a number of Offices and operating Bureaus. One of those is the Media Bureau, which has day-to-day responsibility for developing, recommending, and administering the rules governing the media, including radio and television stations. The FCC's broadcast rules are contained in Title 47 of the Code of Federal Regulations ("CFR"), Parts 73 (broadcast) and 74 (auxiliary broadcast, including low power TV, and translator stations). Our rules of practice and procedure can be found in Title 47 CFR, Part 1. FCC Regulation of Broadcast Radio and Television. The FCC allocates (that is, designates a portion of the broadcast spectrum to) new broadcast stations based upon both the relative needs of various communities for additional broadcast outlets and specified engineering standards designed to prevent interference among stations and to other communications users. As noted above, whenever we review an application – whether to build a new station, modify or renew a license or sell a station – we must determine if its grant would serve the public interest. As discussed earlier, we expect station licensees to be aware of the important problems and issues facing their local communities and to foster public understanding by presenting programming that relates to those local issues. As discussed in this Manual, however, broadcasters – not the FCC or any other government agency – are responsible for selecting the material that they air. By operation of the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, and because the Communications Act expressly prohibits the Commission from censoring broadcast matter, our role in overseeing program content is very limited.

We license only individual broadcast stations. We do not license TV or radio networks (such as CBS, NBC, ABC or Fox) or other organizations with which stations have relationships (such as PBS or NPR), except to the extent that those entities may also be station licensees. We also do not regulate information provided over the Internet, nor do we intervene in private disputes involving broadcast stations or their licensees. Instead, we usually defer to the parties, courts, or other agencies to resolve such disputes.

# THE LICENSING OF TV AND RADIO STATIONS

Commercial and Noncommercial Educational Stations. The FCC licenses FM radio and TV stations as either commercial or noncommercial educational ("NCE"). (All AM radio stations are licensed as commercial facilities.) Commercial stations generally support themselves through the sale of advertising. In contrast, NCE stations generally meet their operating expenses with contributions received from listeners and viewers, and also may receive government funding. In addition, NCE stations may receive contributions from for•profit entities, and are permitted to acknowledge such contributions or underwriting donations with announcements naming and generally describing the contributing party or donor. However, NCE stations may not broadcast commercials or other promotional announcements on behalf of for-profit entities. These limitations on NCE stations are discussed further at page 21 of this Manual.

Applications to Build New Stations; Length of the License Period. Before a party can build a new TV or radio station, it first must apply to the FCC for a construction permit. The applicant must demonstrate in its application that it is qualified to construct and operate the station as specified in its application and that its proposed facility will not cause objectionable interference to any other station. Once its application has been granted, the applicant is issued a construction permit, which authorizes it to build the station within a specified period of time, usually three years. After the applicant (now considered a "permittee") builds the station, it must file a license application, in which it certifies that it has constructed the station consistent with the technical and other terms specified in its construction permit. Upon grant of that license application, the FCC issues the new license to operate to the permittee (now considered a "licensee"), which authorizes the new licensee to operate for a stated period of time, up to eight years. At the close of this period, the licensee must seek renewal of its station license.

Applications for License Renewal. Licenses expire and renewal applications are due on a staggered basis, based upon the state in which the station is licensed. Before we can renew a station's license, we must first determine whether, during the preceding license term, the licensee has served the public interest; has not committed any serious violations of the Communications Act or the FCC's rules; and has not committed other violations which, taken together, would constitute a pattern of abuse. To assist us in this evaluative process, a station licensee must file a renewal application (FCC Form 303-S), in which it must respond concerning whether:

- it has sent us certain required reports;
- neither it nor its owners have or have had any interest in a broadcast application involved in an FCC proceeding in which character issues were resolved adversely to the applicant or were left unresolved, or were raised in connection with a pending application;
- its ownership is consistent with the Communications Act's restrictions on licensee interests held by foreign governments, foreign corporations, and non-U.S. citizens;
- there has not been an adverse finding or adverse final action against it or its owners by a court or administrative body in a civil or criminal proceeding involving a felony, mass media-related antitrust or unfair competition law, the making of fraudulent statements to a governmental unit, or discrimination:

- there were no adjudicated violations of the Communications Act or the Commission's rules during the current license term;
- neither the licensee nor its owners have been denied federal benefits due to drug law violations;
- its station operation complies with the Commission's radiofrequency ("RF") radiation exposure standards;
  - it has, in a timely manner, placed and maintained certain specified materials in its public inspection file (as discussed at pages 25-31 of this Manual);
  - it has not discontinued station operations for more than 12 consecutive months during the preceding license term and is currently broadcasting programming;
  - it has filed FCC Form 396, the Broadcast Equal Employment Opportunity Program Report; and
  - if the application is for renewal of a television license, it has complied with the limitations on commercial matter aired during children's programming and filed the necessary Children's Television Programming Reports (FCC Form 398) (as discussed at page 17 of this Manual).

**Digital Television.** After February 17, 2009, all full-power TV stations are required to stop broadcasting in analog and continue broadcasting only in digital. This is known as the "DTV transition." Because digital is much more efficient than analog, part of the scarce and valuable spectrum that is currently used for analog broadcasting will be used for important new services such as enhanced public safety communications for police, fire departments, and emergency rescue workers. Part of the spectrum will also be made available for advanced wireless services such as wireless broadband.

Digital broadcasting also enables television stations to offer viewers several benefits. For example, stations broadcasting in digital can offer viewers improved picture and sound quality as well as more programming options (referred to as "multicasting") because digital technology gives each television station the ability to broadcast multiple channels at the same time.

Consumers who receive television signals via over-the-air antennas (as opposed to subscribers to pay services like cable and satellite TV) will be able to receive digital signals on their analog sets if they purchase a digital-to-analog converter box that converts the digital signals to analog. Alternatively, if consumers purchase a digital television (a TV with built in digital tuner), they will be able to receive digital broadcast programming. If your TV set receives local broadcast stations through a paid provider such as cable or satellite TV, it is already prepared for the DTV transition.

Regarding consumers who are shopping for new televisions, the Commission's digital tuner rule prohibits the importation or interstate shipment of any device containing an analog tuner unless it also contains a digital tuner. Retailers may continue to sell analog-only devices from existing inventory. However, at the point of sale, retailers must post notices advising consumers that TV sets and equipment such as VCRs that contain only an analog tuner will not be able to receive over-the-air-television signals from full-power broadcast stations after February 17, 2009, without the use of a digital-to-analog converter box.

Television broadcasters must promote public awareness of the DTV transition with an on-air education campaign, providing consumers with information about the transition. They must report their efforts on a quarterly basis by filing FCC Form 388 with the Commission, posting each such Form on their website and placing them in their station public inspection files.

While the February 17, 2009, deadline for ending analog broadcasts does not apply to low-power, Class A, and TV translator stations, these stations will eventually transition to all-digital service. In the meantime, some consumers may continue to receive programming from these stations in analog format after the transition date.

**Digital Radio.** The FCC has also approved digital operation for AM and FM radio broadcast stations (often referred to as "HD Radio"). As with DTV, digital radio substantially improves the quality of the radio signal and allows a station to offer multicasting over several programming streams, as well as certain enhanced services. Unlike the mandatory digital transition deadline for television stations however, radio stations will be able to continue to operate in analog and will have discretion whether also to transmit in digital and, if so, when to begin such operation. In order to receive the digital signals of those stations that choose to so operate, consumers will have to purchase new receivers.

Because digital radio technology allows a radio station to transmit simultaneously in both analog and digital, however, listeners will be able to continue to use their current radios to receive the analog signals of radio stations that transmit both analog and digital signals. Receivers are being marketed that incorporate both modes of reception, with the ability to automatically switch to the analog signal if the digital signal cannot be detected or is lost by the receiver. ### **Public Participation in the Licensing Process**

Renewal Applications. You can submit a protest against a station's license renewal application by filing a formal petition to deny its application, or by sending us an informal objection to the application. Before its license expires, each station licensee must broadcast a series of announcements providing the date its license will expire, the filing date for the renewal application, the date by which formal petitions against it must be filed, and the location of the station's public inspection file that contains the application. Petitions to deny the application must be filed by the end of the first day of the last full calendar month of the expiring license term. (For example, if the license expires on December 31, we must receive any petition at our Washington, D.C. headquarters by the end of the day on December 1.)

Broadcast licenses generally expire on a staggered basis, by state, with most radio licenses next expiring between October 1, 2011 and August 1, 2014, and most television licenses expiring between October 1, 2012 and August 1, 2015, one year after the radio licenses in the same state. A listing of the next expiration dates for radio and television licenses, by state, can be found on the Commission's website at <a href="http://www.fcc.gov/localism/renewals.html">http://www.fcc.gov/localism/renewals.html</a>. Before you file a petition to deny an application, you should check our rules and policies to make sure that your petition complies with our procedural requirements. A more complete description of these procedures and requirements can be found on the Commission's website at <a href="http://www.fcc.gov/localism/renew\_process\_handout.pdf">http://www.fcc.gov/localism/renew\_process\_handout.pdf</a>. You can also file an informal objection at any

time before we either grant or deny the application. Instructions for filing informal objections can be found on the Commission's website at <a href="http://www.fcc.gov/localism/renew\_process\_handout.pdf">http://www.fcc.gov/localism/renew\_process\_handout.pdf</a>. Other Types of Applications. You can also participate in the application process by filing a petition to deny when someone applies for a new station, and when a station is to be sold (technically called an "assignment" of the license), its licensee is to undergo a major transfer of stock or other ownership, or control (technically called a "transfer of control"), or the station proposes major facility changes. The applicant is required to publish a series of notices in the closest local newspaper, containing information similar to that noted above regarding renewal applications, when it files these types of applications. Upon receipt of the application, the FCC will issue a Public Notice and begin a 30-day period during which petitions to deny these applications may be filed. (All FCC Public Notices are included in the Commission's Daily Digest and are posted on our website at <a href="http://www.fcc.gov/Daily\_Releases/Daily\_Digest">http://www.fcc.gov/Daily\_Releases/Daily\_Digest</a>). As with renewal applications, you can also file an informal objection to these types of applications, or any other applications, at any time before we either grant or deny the application. Again, if you have any specific questions about our processes or the status of a particular application involving a station, you may contact our Broadcast Information Specialist for radio or television, depending on the nature of your inquiry, by calling toll-free, by facsimile, or by sending an e-mail in the manner noted at pages 32-33 of this Manual.

### **BROADCAST PROGRAMMING: BASIC LAW AND POLICY**

The FCC and Freedom of Speech. The First Amendment, as well as Section 326 of the Communications Act, prohibits the Commission from censoring broadcast material and from interfering with freedom of expression in broadcasting. The Constitution's protection of free speech includes that of programming that may be objectionable to many viewer or listeners. Thus, the FCC cannot prevent the broadcast of any particular point of view. In this regard, the Commission has observed that "the public interest is best served by permitting free expression of views." However, the right to broadcast material is not absolute. There are some restrictions on the material that a licensee can broadcast. We discuss these restrictions below.

**Licensee Discretion.** Because the Commission cannot dictate to licensees what programming they may air, each individual radio and TV station licensee generally has discretion to select what its station broadcasts and to otherwise determine how it can best serve its community of license. Licensees are responsible for selecting their entertainment programming, as well as programs concerning local issues, news, public affairs, religion, sports events, and other subjects. As discussed at page 29 of this Manual, broadcast licensees must periodically make available detailed information about the programming that they air to meet the needs and problems of their communities, which can be found in each station public file. They also decide how their programs will be structured and whether to edit or reschedule material for broadcasting. In light of the First Amendment and Section 326 of the Communications Act, we do not substitute our judgment for that of the licensee, nor do we advise stations on artistic standards, format, grammar, or the quality of their programming. Licensees also have broad discretion regarding

commercials, with the exception of those for political candidates during an election and the limitations on advertisements aired during children's programming (we discuss these respective requirements at pages 13-14, and 17 of this Manual).

Criticism, Ridicule, and Humor Concerning Individuals, Groups, and Institutions. The First Amendment's guarantee of freedom of speech similarly protects programming that stereotypes or may otherwise offend people with regard to their religion, race, national background, gender, or other characteristics. It also protects broadcasts that criticize or ridicule established customs and institutions, including the government and its officials. The Commission recognizes that, under our Constitution, people must be free to say things that the majority may abhor, not only what most people may find tolerable or congenial. However, if you are offended by a station's programming, we urge you to make your concerns known to the station licensee, in writing.

**Programming Access.** In light of their discretion to formulate their programming, station licensees are not required to broadcast everything that is offered or otherwise suggested to them. Except as required by the Communications Act, including the use of stations by candidates for public office (discussed at pages 13-14 of this Manual), licensees have no obligation to allow any particular person or group to participate in a broadcast or to present that person or group's remarks.

### BROADCAST PROGRAMMING: POLICY ON SPECIFIC KINDS OF PROGRAMMING

### **Broadcast Journalism**

**Introduction.** As noted above, in light of the fundamental importance of the free flow of information to our democracy, the First Amendment and the Communications Act bar the FCC from telling station licensees how to select material for news programs, or prohibiting the broadcast of an opinion on any subject. We also do not review anyone's qualifications to gather, edit, announce, or comment on the news; these decisions are the station licensee's responsibility. Nevertheless, there are two issues related to broadcast journalism that are subject to Commission regulation: hoaxes and news distortion.

**Hoaxes.** The broadcast by a station of false information concerning a crime or catastrophe violates the FCC's rules if:

- the station licensee knew that the information was false,
- broadcasting the false information directly causes substantial public harm, and
- it was foreseeable that broadcasting the false information would cause such harm.

In this context, a "crime" is an act or omission that makes the offender subject to criminal punishment by law, and a "catastrophe" is a disaster or an imminent disaster involving violent or sudden events affecting the public. The broadcast must cause direct and actual damage to property or to the health or safety of the

general public, or diversion of law enforcement or other public health and safety authorities from their duties, and the public harm must begin immediately. If a station airs a disclaimer before the broadcast that clearly characterizes the program as fiction and the disclaimer is presented in a reasonable manner under the circumstances, the program is presumed not to pose foreseeable public harm. News Distortion. The Commission often receives complaints concerning broadcast journalism, such as allegations that stations have aired inaccurate or one-sided news reports or comments, covered stories inadequately, or overly dramatized the events that they cover. For the reasons noted above, the Commission generally will not intervene in such cases because it would be inconsistent with the First Amendment to replace the journalistic judgment of licensees with our own. However, as public trustees, broadcast licensees may not intentionally distort the news: the FCC has stated that "rigging or slanting the news is a most heinous act against the public interest." The Commission will investigate a station for news distortion if it receives documented evidence of such rigging or slanting, such as testimony or other documentation, from individuals with direct personal knowledge that a licensee or its management engaged in the intentional falsification of the news. Of particular concern would be evidence of the direction to employees from station management to falsify the news. However, absent such a compelling showing, the Commission will not intervene. **Political Broadcasting: Candidates for Public Office.** In recognition of the particular importance of the free flow of information to the public during the electoral process, the Communications Act and the Commission's rules impose specific obligations on broadcasters regarding political speech.

- **Reasonable Access.** The Communications Act requires that broadcast stations provide "reasonable access" to candidates for federal elective office. Such access must be made available during all of a station's normal broadcast schedule, including television prime time and radio drive time. In addition, federal candidates are entitled to purchase all classes of time offered by stations to commercial advertisers, such as preemptible and non-preemptible time. The only exception to the access requirement is for *bona fide* news programming (as defined below), during which broadcasters may choose not to sell airtime to federal candidates. Broadcast stations have discretion as to whether to sell time to candidates in state and local elections.
- **Equal Opportunities**. The Communications Act requires that, when a station provides airtime to a legally qualified candidate for any public office (federal, state, or local), the station must "afford equal opportunities to all other such candidates for that office." The equal opportunities provision of the Communications Act also provides that the station "shall have no power of censorship over the material broadcast" by the candidate. The law exempts from the equal opportunities requirement appearances by candidates during *bona fide* news programming, defined as an appearance by a legally qualified candidate on a *bona fide* newscast, interview, or documentary (if the appearance of the candidate is incidental to the presentation of the subject covered by the documentary) or on—the—spot coverage of a *bona fide* news event (including debates, political conventions and related incidental activities).

In addition, a station must sell political advertising time to certain candidates during specified periods before a primary or general election at the lowest rate charged for the station's most favored commercial advertiser. Stations must maintain and make available for public inspection, in their public inspection files, a political file containing certain documents and information, discussed at page 28 of this Manual. ### **Objectionable Programming**

**Programming Inciting "Imminent Lawless Action."** The Supreme Court has held that the government may curtail speech if it is both: (1) intended to incite or produce "imminent lawless action;" and (2) likely to "incite or produce such action." Even when this legal test is met, any review that might lead to a curtailment of speech is generally performed by the appropriate criminal law enforcement authorities, not by the FCC.

**Obscene, Indecent, or Profane Programming.** Although, for the reasons discussed earlier, the Commission is generally prohibited from regulating broadcast content, the courts have held that the FCC's regulation of obscene and indecent programming is constitutional, because of the compelling societal interests in protecting children from potentially harmful programming and supporting parents' ability to determine the programming to which their children will be exposed at home.

<u>Obscene material</u> is not protected by the First Amendment and cannot be broadcast at any time. To be obscene, the material must have all of the following three characteristics:

- an average person, applying contemporary community standards, must find that the material, as a whole, appeals to the prurient interest;
- the material must depict or describe, in a patently offensive way, sexual conduct specifically defined by applicable law; and
- the material, taken as a whole, must lack serious literary, artistic, political, or scientific value.

<u>Indecent material</u> is protected by the First Amendment, so its broadcast cannot constitutionally be prohibited at all times. However, the courts have upheld Congress' prohibition of the broadcast of indecent material during times of the day in which there is a reasonable risk that children may be in the audience, which the Commission has determined to be between the hours of 6 a.m. and 10 p.m. Indecent programming is defined as "language or material that, in context, depicts or describes, in terms patently offensive as measured by contemporary community standards for the broadcast medium, sexual or excretory organs or activities." Broadcasts that fall within this definition and are aired between 6 a.m. and 10 p.m. may be subject to enforcement action by the FCC.

<u>Profane material</u> also is protected by the First Amendment, so its broadcast cannot be outlawed entirely. The Commission has defined such program matter to include language that is both "so grossly offensive to members of the public who actually hear it as to amount to a nuisance" and is sexual or excretory in nature or derived from such terms. Such material may be the subject of possible Commission enforcement action if it is broadcast within the same time period applicable to indecent programming: between 6 a.m. and 10 p. m.

How to File an Obscenity, Indecency, or Profanity Complaint: In order to allow its staff to make a determination of whether complained-of material is actionable, the Commission requires that complainants

provide certain information: (1) the date and time of the alleged broadcast; (2) the call sign, channel or frequency of the station involved; and (3) the details of what was actually said (or depicted) during the alleged indecent, profane, or obscene broadcast. Submission of an audio or video tape, CD, DVD or other recording or transcript of the complained-of material is not required but is helpful, as is specification of the name of the program, the on-air personality, song, or film, and the city and state in which the complainant saw or heard the broadcast.

The fastest and easiest way to file a complaint containing this information is to use the FCC's electronic complaint form, Form 475B, which is available on the FCC's website at <a href="http://fjallfoss.fcc.gov/cgb/fcc475B.cfm">http://fjallfoss.fcc.gov/cgb/fcc475B.cfm</a>.

**Violent Programming.** Many members of the public have expressed concern about violent television programming and the negative impact such broadcast material may have upon children. In response to these concerns, and at the request of 39 members of the U.S. House of Representatives, the FCC conducted a proceeding seeking public comment on violent programming. In April 2007, the Commission delivered

to Congress a Report recommending that the industry voluntarily commit to reducing the amount of such programming viewed by children. The Commission also suggested that Congress consider enacting legislation that would better support parents' efforts to safeguard their children from such objectionable programming. The V-Chip and TV Program Ratings. In light of the widespread concern about obscene, indecent, profane, violent, or otherwise objectionable programming, in 1996, Congress passed a law to require TV sets with screens 13 inches or larger to be equipped with a "V-Chip" – a device that allows parents to program their sets to block TV programming that carries a certain rating. Since 2000, all such sets manufactured with screens 13 inches or larger must contain the V-Chip technology. This technology, which must be activated by parents, works in conjunction with a voluntary television rating system created and administered by the television industry and others, which enables parents to identify programming containing sexual, violent, or other content that they believe may be harmful to their children. All of the major broadcast networks and most of the major cable networks are encoding their programming with this ratings information to work with the V•Chip. However, some programming, such as news and sporting events, and unedited movies aired on premium cable channels, are not rated. In 2004, the FCC expanded the V-Chip requirement to apply also to devices that do not have a display screen but are used with a TV set, such as a VCR or a digital-to-analog converter box.

### **Other Broadcast Content Regulation**

**Station Identification.** Stations must air identification announcements when they sign on and off for the day. They also must broadcast these announcements every hour, as close to the start of the hour as possible, at a natural programming break. TV stations may make these announcements on-screen or by voice only. Official station identification includes the station's call letters, followed by the community specified in its license as the station's location. Between the call letters and its community, the station may insert the name of the licensee, the station's channel number, and/or its frequency. It may also include any additional community or communities, as long as it first names the community to which it is licensed by the FCC. DTV stations also may identify their digital multicast programming streams separately if they wish, and, if so, must follow the format described in the FCC's rules.

Commencing as of a date to be determined, for television stations, twice daily, the station identification will also have to include a notice of the existence, location and accessibility of the station's public file. The notice will have to state that the station's public file is available for inspection and that members of the public can view it at the station's main studio and on its station website. Broadcast of at least one of these announcements will be required between the hours of 6 p.m. and midnight.

**Children's Television Programming.** Throughout its license term, every TV station must serve the educational and informational needs of children both by means of its overall programming and through programming that is specifically designed to serve those needs. Licensees are eligible for routine staff-

level approval of the Children's Television Act portion of their renewal applications if they air at least three hours of "core" children's television programming, per week, or proportionally more if they provide additional free digital programming streams. Core programming is defined as follows:

- <u>Educational and Informational</u>. The programming must further the educational and informational needs of children 16 years old and under (this includes their intellectual/cognitive or social/emotional needs).
- <u>Specifically Designed to Serve These Needs</u>. A program is considered "specifically designed to serve the educational and information needs of children" if: (1) that is its significant purpose; (2) it is aired between the hours of 7 a.m. and 10 p.m.; (3) it is a regularly scheduled weekly program; and (4) it is at least 30 minutes in duration.

To ensure that parents and other interested parties are informed of the educational and informational children's programming that their area stations offer, television licensees must identify each program specifically designed to "educate and inform" children by displaying the icon "E/I" throughout the program. In addition, commercial stations must provide information identifying such programs to the publishers of program guides.

During the broadcast of TV programs aimed at children 12 and under, advertising may not exceed 10.5 minutes an hour on weekends and 12 minutes an hour on weekdays.

These rules apply to analog and digital broadcasting. As discussed at page 9 of this Manual, television stations have traditionally operated with analog technology. Television stations, however, are in the process of switching to digital broadcasting, which greatly enhances their capability to serve their communities. Among other things, digital technology permits stations to engage in multicasting, that is, to air more than one stream of programming at the same time. Digital stations that choose to air more than one stream of free, over-the-air video programming must air proportionately more children's educational programming than stations that air only one stream of free, over-the-air video programming.

Each television licensee is required to prepare and place in the public inspection file at the station a quarterly Children's Television Programming Report (FCC Form 398) identifying its core programming. These reports must also be filed electronically with the FCC each quarter and can be viewed on the FCC's website, at <a href="http://www.fcc.gov/mb/engineering/kidvid">http://www.fcc.gov/mb/engineering/kidvid</a>. This requirement of the station's public file is discussed at page 29 of this Manual.

The FCC has created a children's educational television website to inform parents and other members of the public about the obligation of every television broadcast station to provide educational and informational programming for children. This website provides access to background information about these obligations, as well as information about children's educational programs that are aired on television stations in your area and throughout the country. This website also can help TV stations comply with the children's television requirements. You can access the children's educational television website by going to the FCC's main website at <a href="http://www.fcc.gov">http://www.fcc.gov</a> and double-clicking on the "Parents' Place" listing under "Consumer Center" on the FCC home page. **Station-Conducted Contests.** A station that broadcasts or advertises information about a contest that it conducts must fully and accurately disclose the material terms of the contest, and must conduct the contest substantially as announced or advertised. Contest descriptions may not be false, misleading, or deceptive with respect to any material term, including the factors that define the operation of the contest and affect participation, such as entry deadlines, the prizes that can be won, and how winners will be selected. **Lotteries.** Federal law prohibits the broadcast of advertisements for a lottery or information concerning a lottery. A lottery is any game, contest, or promotion that contains the elements of prize, chance, and "consideration" (a legal term that means an act or promise that is made to induce someone into an agreement). For example, casino gambling is generally considered to be a "lottery" subject to the terms of the advertising restriction although, as discussed below, the prohibition is not applied to truthful advertisements for lawful casino gambling. Many types of contests, depending on their particulars, also are covered under this definition.

The statute and FCC rules list a number of exceptions to this prohibition, principally advertisements for: (1) lotteries conducted by a state acting under the authority of state law, when the advertisement or information is broadcast by a radio or TV station licensed to a location in that state or in any other state that conducts such a lottery; (2) gambling conducted by an Indian Tribe under the Indian Gaming Regulatory Act; (3) lotteries authorized or not otherwise prohibited by the state in which they are conducted, and which are conducted by a not•for•profit organization or a governmental organization; and (4) lotteries conducted as a promotional activity by commercial organizations that are clearly occasional and ancillary to the primary business of that organization, as long as the lotteries are authorized or not otherwise prohibited by the state in which they are conducted.

In 1999, the Supreme Court held that the prohibition on broadcasting advertisements for lawful casino gambling could not constitutionally be applied to truthful advertisements broadcast by radio or television stations licensed in states in which such gambling is legal. Relying upon the reasoning in that decision, the FCC and the United States Department of Justice later concluded that the lottery advertising prohibition may not constitutionally be applied to the broadcast of any truthful advertisements for lawful casino gambling, whether or not the state in which the broadcasting station is located permits casino gambling. **Soliciting Funds.** No federal law prohibits the broadcast by stations of requests for funds for legal purposes (including appeals by stations for contributions to meet their operating expenses), if the money or other contributions are used for the announced purposes. However, federal law prohibits fraud by wire, radio or television – including situations in which money solicited for one purpose is used for another – and doing so may lead to FCC sanctions, as well as to criminal prosecution by the U.S. Department of Justice. Broadcast of Telephone Conversations. Before broadcasting a telephone conversation live or recording a telephone conversation for later broadcast, a station must inform any party to the call of its intention to broadcast the conversation. However, that notification is not necessary when the other party knows that the conversation will be broadcast or such knowledge can be reasonably presumed, such as when the party is associated with the station (for example, as an employee or part-time reporter) or originates the call during a program during which the station customarily broadcasts the calls. ### ACCESS TO BROADCAST MATERIAL BY PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

The Communications Act and the Commission's rules require television station licensees to broadcast certain information that makes viewing more accessible to people with disabilities.

Closed Captioning. Closed captioning is a technology designed to provide access to television programming by persons with hearing disabilities by displaying, in text form, the audio portion of a broadcast, as well as descriptions of background noise and sound effects. Closed captioning is hidden as encoded data transmitted within the television signal. A viewer wishing to see the captions must use a settop decoder or a television with built-in decoder circuitry. All television sets with screens 13 inches or larger manufactured since mid-1993, including digital sets, have built-in decoder circuitry.

As directed by Congress in the Telecommunications Act of 1996, the FCC has adopted rules requiring closed captioning of most, but not all, television programming. The rules require those that distribute television programs directly to home viewers, including broadcast stations, to comply with these rules. The rules also provide certain exemptions from the captioning requirements. Access to Emergency Information. The FCC also requires television stations to make the local emergency information that they provide to viewers accessible to persons with disabilities. Thus, if emergency information is provided aurally, such information also must be provided in a visual format for persons who are deaf or hard of hearing. The emergency information may be closed captioned or presented through an alternative method of visual presentation. Such methods include open captioning, crawls, or scrolls that appear on the screen. The information provided visually must include critical details regarding the emergency and how to respond. Critical details could include, among other things, specific information regarding the areas that will be affected by the emergency, evacuation orders, detailed descriptions of areas to be evacuated, specific evacuation routes, approved shelters or the way to take shelter in one's home, instructions on how to secure personal property, road closures, and how to obtain relief assistance. Similarly, if the emergency information is presented visually, it must be made accessible. If the emergency information interrupts programming, such as through a crawl, such information must be accompanied with an aural tone to alert persons with visual disabilities that the station

is providing this information so that such persons may be alerted to turn to another source, such as a radio, for more information. Additional information concerning this requirement can be found on the FCC website at http://ftp.fcc.gov/cgb/consumerfacts/emergencyvideo.html.

### **BUSINESS PRACTICES AND ADVERTISING**

Business Practices, Advertising Rates, and Profits. Except for the requirements concerning political advertisements (discussed at pages 13-14 of this Manual), the limits on the number of commercials that can be aired during children's programming (see page 17), and the prohibition of advertisements over noncommercial educational stations (see pages 21-22), the Commission does not regulate a licensee's business practices, such as its advertising rates or its profits. Rates charged for broadcast time are matters for private negotiation between sponsors and stations. Further, except for certain classes of political advertisements (see pages 13-14), station licensees have full discretion to accept or reject any advertising.

**Employment Discrimination and Equal Employment Opportunity ("EEO").** The FCC requires that all licensees of radio and TV stations afford equal opportunity in employment. We also prohibit employment discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, or sex. However, religious stations are permitted to require that some or all of their employees meet a religious qualification.

Our EEO recruitment rules have three prongs. They require all stations that employ five or more full-time employees (defined as those regularly working 30 hours a week or more) to:

- widely distribute information concerning each full-time job vacancy, except for vacancies that need to be filled under demanding or other special circumstances;
- send notices of openings to organizations in the community that are involved in employment if the organization requests such notices; and
- engage in general outreach activities every two years, such as job fairs, internships, and other community events.

Each licensee with five or more full-time employees must maintain records of its recruitment efforts, and create and place in its public file an annual public file report listing specified information about its recruitment efforts. (The requirements for the EEO portion of the public file are discussed at page 28 of this Manual.) The annual EEO public file report must also be posted on a station's website, if one exists. In addition, television licensees with five or more full-time employees and radio licensees with 11 or more full-time employees must file an FCC Form 397 Broadcast Mid-Term Report. Each licensee, regardless of size, must file an FCC Form 396 EEO Program Report with its license renewal application. Finally, a prospective station licensee must file an FCC Form 396-A Broadcast Model Program Report with its new station or assignment or transfer application. The FCC reviews EEO compliance at the time that it considers the station renewal application, when it reviews Broadcast Mid-Term Reports, when it receives EEO complaints, and during random station audits. A full range of enforcement actions is available for EEO violations, including the imposition of reporting conditions, forfeitures, short-term license renewal,

and license revocation.

All EEO forms are electronically filed and are available for public review in CDBS, the FCC's access database (to access these reports, see <a href="http://fjallfoss.fcc.gov/prod/cdbs/pubacc/prod/eeo\_search.htm">http://fjallfoss.fcc.gov/prod/cdbs/pubacc/prod/eeo\_search.htm</a>). As discussed at page 27 of this Manual, in addition, copies of all FCC EEO audit letters, licensee responses, and FCC rulings must be included in the audited station's public file and are available for public review at the FCC Public Reference Center in Washington, D.C. Additional information concerning the EEO rules is available at <a href="http://www.fcc.gov/mb/policy/eeo/">http://www.fcc.gov/mb/policy/eeo/</a>.

Sponsorship Identification. The sponsorship identification requirements contained in the Communications Act and the Commission's rules generally require that, when money or other consideration for the airing of program material has been received by or promised to a station, its employees or others, the station must broadcast full disclosure of that fact at the time of the airing of the material, and identify who provided or promised to provide the consideration. This requirement is grounded in the principle that members of the public should know who is trying to persuade them with the programming being aired. This disclosure requirement also applies to the broadcast of musical selections for consideration (so-called "payola") and the airing of certain video news releases. In the case of advertisements for commercial products or services, it is sufficient for a station to announce the sponsor's corporate or trade name, or the name of the sponsor's product (where it is clear that the mention of the product constitutes a sponsorship identification). Underwriting Announcements on Noncommercial Educational Stations. Noncommercial educational stations may acknowledge contributions over the air, but they may not broadcast commercials or otherwise promote the goods and services of for profit donors or underwriters. Acceptable "enhanced underwriting" acknowledgements of for profit donors or underwriters may include: (1) logograms and slogans that identify but do not promote; (2) location information; (3) value-neutral descriptions of a product line or service; and (4) brand names, trade names, and product service listings. However, such acknowledgements may not interrupt the station's regular programming. **Loud Commercials.** The FCC does not regulate the volume of broadcast programming, including commercials. Surveys and technical studies reveal that the perceived loudness of particular broadcast matter is a subjective judgment that varies with each viewer and listener and is influenced by many factors, such as the material's content and style and the voice and tone of the person speaking. The FCC has found no evidence that stations deliberately raise audio and modulation levels to emphasize commercial messages.

Manually controlling the set's volume level or using the "mute" button with a remote control constitutes the simplest approach to reducing volume levels deemed to be excessive. Many television receivers are equipped with circuits that are designed to stabilize the loudness between programs and commercials. These functions usually must be activated through the receiver's "set up/audio" menu. Should these techniques fail to resolve the problem, you may consider addressing any complaint about broadcast volume levels to the licensee of the station involved. **False or Misleading Advertising.** The Federal Trade Commission has primary responsibility for determining whether an advertisement is false or deceptive and for taking action against the sponsor. The Food and Drug Administration has primary responsibility for the safety of food and drug products. Depending on the nature of the advertisement, you should contact these agencies regarding advertisements that you believe may be false or misleading. Additional information about false or misleading advertising can be found at http://www.fcc.gov/cgb/consumerfacts/advertising.html.

Offensive Advertising. Unless a broadcast advertisement is found to be in violation of a specific law or rule, the government cannot take action against it. However, if you believe that an advertisement is offensive because of the nature of the item advertised, the scheduling of the announcement, or the manner in which the message is presented, you should consider addressing your complaint directly to the station or network involved, providing the date and time of the broadcast and the product or advertiser in question. This will help those involved in the selection of advertising material to become better informed about audience opinion.

**Tobacco and Alcohol Advertising.** Federal law prohibits the airing of advertising for cigarettes, little cigars, smokeless tobacco, and chewing tobacco on radio, TV, or any other medium of electronic communication under the FCC's jurisdiction. However, the advertising of smoking accessories, cigars, pipes, pipe tobacco, or cigarette•making machines is not prohibited. Congress has not enacted any law prohibiting broadcast advertising of any kind of alcoholic beverage, and the FCC does not have a rule or policy regulating such advertisements.

**Subliminal Programming.** The Commission sometimes receives complaints regarding the alleged use of subliminal perception techniques in broadcast programming. Subliminal programming is designed to be perceived on a subconscious level only. Regardless of whether it is effective, the broadcast of subliminal material is inconsistent with a station's obligation to serve the public interest because it is designed to be deceptive.

### **BLANKETING INTERFERENCE**

**Rules.** Some members of the public situated close to a radio station's transmitting antenna may experience impaired reception of other stations. This is called "blanketing" interference. The Commission's rules impose certain obligations on licensees to resolve such interference complaints. Complaints about such interference involving radio stations are handled by the Media Bureau's Audio Division. Blanketing interference is a less common occurrence with television stations than with radio stations due to the location and height of TV transmitting antennas. If this phenomenon does occur with a television station, the Media Bureau's Video Division will handle complaints on a case-by case-basis, subject to the radio guidelines noted below.

At the outset, the policy is designed to provide protection from interference for individuals within a certain distance from a station (in an area known as the station's "blanketing contour") and only involving

electronic devices that pick up an over-the-air signal from a broadcast radio or television station. Thus, stations are **not** required to resolve interference complaints involving the following:

- A complaint from a party located outside of the station's blanketing contour (115 dBu contour for FM stations, 1 V/m contour for AM stations).
- Improperly installed antenna systems.
- Use of high gain antennas or antenna booster amplifiers.
- Mobile receivers, including but not limited to car radios, portable stereos or cellular phones.
- Non•radio frequency ("RF") devices, including but not limited to, tape recorders, CD players, MP3 players or "land-line" telephones.
- Cordless telephones.

For complaints from parties located within the station's blanketing contour involving non-mobile television or radio receivers, a station must resolve the interference complaint at no cost to the complaining party if the party notifies the station of the problem during the first year that the station operates its new or modified facilities. For similar complaints received after the first year of such operation has passed, although the station is not financially responsible for resolving the complaint, it must provide effective technical assistance to the complaining party. These efforts must include the provision of information and assistance sufficiently specific to enable the complaining party to eliminate all blanketing interference and not simply an attempt by the station to correct the problems. Such assistance entails providing specific details about proper corrective measures to resolve the blanketing interference. For example, stations should provide the complaining party with diagrams and descriptions which explain how and where to use radiofrequency chokes, ferrite cores, filters, and/or shielded cable. In addition, effective technical assistance also includes recommending replacement equipment that would work better in high radiofrequency fields. Effective technical assistance does not mean referring the complainant to the equipment manufacturer.

How to Resolve Blanketing Interference Problems. If you believe that you are receiving blanketing or any other type of interference to broadcast reception, we encourage you to first communicate directly, in writing, with the licensee of the station that you believe is causing the interference. If the licensee does not satisfactorily resolve the problem, you can mail, fax, or e-mail a complaint to us as follows:

Your complaint should include: (1) your name, address, and phone number; (2) the call letters of each station involved; (3) each location at which the interference occurs; and (4) each specific device receiving the interference. The more specific your complaint is, the easier it is for us and any station involved to identify and resolve the interference problem.

### OTHER INTERFERENCE ISSUES

In many cases in which you receive interference on your television set or radio, the source of the problem could be with your equipment, which may not be adequately designed with circuitry or filtering to reject the unwanted signals of nearby transmitters. We recommend that you contact the equipment manufacturer or the store at which the equipment was purchased to attempt to resolve the interference problem. ### THE LOCAL PUBLIC INSPECTION FILE

**Requirement to Maintain a Public Inspection File.** Our rules require that all licensees and permittees of TV and radio stations and applicants for new broadcast stations maintain a file available for public inspection. This file must contain documents relevant to the station's operation and dealings with the community and the FCC. The public inspection file generally must be maintained at the station's main studio. To obtain the location and phone number of a station's main studio, consult your local telephone directory, or call the station's business office. You may also be able to find this information on the station's Internet website, if one exists.

**Purpose of the File.** Because we do not routinely monitor each station's programming and operations, viewers and listeners are an important source of information about the nature of their area stations' programming, operations, and compliance with their FCC obligations. The documents contained in each station's public inspection file have information about the station that can assist the public in this important monitoring role.

As discussed in this Manual, every station has an obligation to provide news, public affairs, and other programming that specifically treats the important issues facing its community, and to comply with the

Communications Act, the Commission's rules, and the terms of its station license. We encourage a continuing dialogue between broadcasters and members of the public to ensure that stations meet their obligations and remain responsive to the needs of the local community. Because you watch and listen to the stations that we license, you can be a valuable and effective advocate to ensure that your area's stations comply with their localism obligation and other FCC requirements.

**Viewing the Public Inspection File.** Each broadcast licensee, permittee, and applicant must make its station public inspection file available to members of the public at any time during regular business hours. Although you do not need to make an appointment to view the file, making one may be helpful both to the station and to you.

A station that chooses to maintain all or part of its public file on a computer database must provide you a computer terminal if you wish to review the file. As of a date to be determined, television stations will also be required to post most of the content of their public files on their Internet websites, if they have them, or on their state broadcasters association's website, if permitted. Radio stations have not yet been required to post their files on their websites, but may do so if they wish. If you want to view a station's public file over the Internet, you should check its website or contact the station to determine if the file is posted.

You may request copies of materials in the file, which the station must provide to you at a reasonable charge, by visiting the station in person. In addition, if the station's public file is located outside of its community of license (and you live within the station's service area and your request does not involve the station's political file), you may request copies of materials in the file over the telephone. To facilitate telephone requests, we require stations to provide you a copy of the current version of this Manual free of charge if you so request. The Manual can help you identify other documents you may ask to have mailed to you. Stations should assist callers in this process and answer questions you may have about the actual contents of the public file. This information may include, for example, the number of pages and time periods covered by a particular ownership report or children's television programming report, or the types of applications actually maintained in the station's public file and the dates on which they were filed with the FCC. Finally, if you ask a broadcast station for photocopies of material in its public inspection file, the station may require you to pay for those photocopies. Therefore, the station may require a guarantee of payment in advance (such as with a deposit or a credit card). The station must pay the postage for copies requested by telephone. Stations must fulfill requests for copies within a reasonable period of time, which generally should not exceed seven calendar days after the request is made. For additional information on these public file requirements, see http://www.fcc.gov/eb/broadcast/pif.html.

Contents of the File. The following materials must be maintained in each station public inspection file:

The License. Stations must keep a copy of their current FCC construction permit or license in the public file, together with any material documenting Commission-approved modifications to the authorization. The license or permit reflects the station's authorized technical parameters (such as its frequency, call letters, operating power and transmitter location), as well as any special conditions imposed by the FCC on the station's operation. It also indicates when it was issued and when it will expire.

**Applications and Related Materials.** The public file must contain copies of all applications involving the station filed with the Commission that are still pending before either the FCC or the courts. These include applications to sell the station or to modify its facilities (for example, to increase power, change the antenna system, or change the transmitter location). If a petition to deny any application was filed, the file must contain a statement to that effect, and the name and address of the petitioning party. Applications must be maintained until "final" FCC action on them, when the action can no longer be appealed or reversed.

The station must also keep copies of any granted construction permit or assignment or transfer application if its grant required us to waive our rules. Applications that required a waiver, together with any related material, will reflect each particular rule that we waived, and must be maintained as long as any such waiver remains in effect.

Also, if the FCC renewed the station license for less than a full term, the station must keep that renewal application (FCC Form 303-S) in the file until grant of its next renewal application by final FCC action. We may grant such a short-term renewal when we are concerned about the station's performance over the previous term. These concerns will be reflected in the renewal-related materials in the public file.

**Citizen Agreements.** Commercial stations must keep copies of any written agreements that they make with local viewers or listeners. These "citizen agreements" may deal with programming, employment, or other issues of community concern. The station must keep these agreements in the public file for as long as they are in effect.

Contour Maps. The public file must contain copies of any station service contour maps or other information submitted with any application filed with the FCC that reflects the station's service contours and/or its main studio and transmitter locations. The Commission's application forms require submission of contour maps only from stations that do not certify that their signals cover their city of license. These documents must stay in the file for as long as they remain current and accurate regarding the station.

Material Relating to an FCC Investigation or Complaint. Stations must keep material relating to any matter that is the subject of an FCC investigation (including EEO audits) or a complaint that the station has violated the Communications Act or FCC rules. The station must keep this material in its file until the FCC notifies it that the material may be discarded. Since the FCC is not involved in disputes regarding matters unrelated to the Communications Act or FCC rules, such as private contractual disputes, stations do not have to retain material relating to such disputes in the public file.

Ownership Reports and Related Material. The public file must contain a copy of the most recent, complete ownership report (FCC Form 323 for commercial stations, FCC Form 323-E for noncommercial educational stations) filed for the station. Among other things, these reports disclose the names of the owners of the station licensee and their ownership interests, list any contracts related to the station that are required to be filed with the FCC, and identify any interests in other

broadcast stations held by the station licensee or its owners.

List of Contracts Required to be Filed with the FCC. Stations must keep in the public file either copies of all the contracts that they have to file with the FCC, or an up-to-date list identifying all such contracts. If the station keeps a list and a member of the public asks to see copies of the actual contracts, the station must provide the copies to the requester within seven calendar days. Contracts required to be maintained or listed in the public inspection file include:

- contracts relating to network service (network affiliation contracts);
- contracts relating to ownership or control of the licensee or permittee or its stock. Examples include articles of incorporation, bylaws, agreements providing for the assignment of a license or permit or affecting stock ownership or voting rights (stock options, pledges, or proxies), and mortgage or loan agreements that restrict the licensee or permittee's freedom of operation; and
- management consultant agreements with independent contractors, and contracts relating to the utilization in a management capacity of any person other than an officer, director, or regular employee of the licensee.

**Political File.** Stations must keep a file which contains "a complete record of a request to purchase broadcast time that: (A) is made by or on behalf of a legally qualified candidate for public office; or (B) communicates a message relating to any political matter of national importance, including: (i) a legally qualified candidate; (ii) any election to federal office; or (iii) a national legislative issue of public importance." The file must identify how the station responded to such requests and, if the request was granted, the charges made, a schedule of time purchased, the times the spots actually aired, the rates charged, and the classes of time purchased. The file also must reflect any free time provided to a candidate. The station must keep the political records in the file for two years after the spot airs. (You can find more information regarding the political broadcasting laws at pages 13-14 of this Manual.)

**EEO Materials.** As noted earlier, licensees must submit certain forms containing EEO information and include copies in their station public files. Thus, all stations employing five or more full-time employees must put an EEO public file report in their station public file each year. We also require each radio and TV station licensee to file a Form 396 EEO Program Report with its license renewal application and to include the Report in its public file. Those licensees that file a Form 397 Broadcast Mid-Term Report must also include a copy in the public file. These materials must be retained in the file until final action on the station's next license renewal application. A new station applicant or prospective station buyer, if it intends to employ five or more full-time employees, must file a Form 396-A Broadcast EEO Model Program Report with its new station assignment or transfer application and the Report must be included in the public file as a part of the underlying application and retained in the file until the grant of the underlying application becomes final. (You can find more information regarding the EEO rules at pages 20-21 of this Manual.)

"The Public and Broadcasting." Stations must keep a copy of the current version of this

Manual in the public file and provide a copy, upon request, to any member of the public. As noted above, you can also request a copy from the FCC or access it on our Internet website at <a href="http://www.fcc.gov/mb/audio/decdoc/public">http://www.fcc.gov/mb/audio/decdoc/public</a> and broadcasting.html.

**Letters and E-Mails from the Public.** Commercial stations must keep in their files, for at least three years, written comments, suggestions, and e-mails received from the public regarding their operation. (Noncommercial educational stations are not subject to this requirement.) This obligation is limited to comments, suggestions, and e-mails sent to station management or a publicized station address. Letters need not be placed in the public inspection file when the author has requested that the letter not be made public or when the licensee feels that it should be excluded from public inspection because of the nature of its content (such as defamatory or obscene letters). Moreover, although television stations that post their public file materials on their websites must include e-mails received from the public, they need not post letters from the public, as long as they include hard copies of such letters in their public files, and a notice on their website that the letters can be located in the file. As noted above, all or a part of a station public file may be maintained on a computer database, as long as a computer terminal is made available, at the location of the file, for members of the public who wish to review the file. Accordingly, as an alternative to maintaining hard copies of emails in the public file, a station may place the e-mails on a computer database, as long as a terminal is made available at the location of the public file to members of the public who wish to review the file.

Quarterly Programming Reports. Every three months, each broadcast radio and television station licensee must prepare and place in its station public file a list of programs containing its most significant treatment of community issues during the preceding three months ("issues/programs lists"). The list must briefly describe both the issue and the programming during which the issue was discussed, including the date and time that each such program was aired and its title and duration. The licensee must keep these lists in the file until the next grant of the station renewal application has become final. Television stations will be required to file a Standardized Television Disclosure Form instead of these lists once that form is approved and made available. The form, which will also be filed quarterly, will require commercial and noncommercial educational television broadcasters to provide detailed information on the efforts of their station to provide programming responsive to issues facing their communities in a standardized format.

Children's Television Programming Reports. As discussed at pages 17-18 of this Manual, the Children's Television Act of 1990 and our rules require each TV station to serve the educational and informational needs of children by means of its overall programming and through programming that is specifically designed to serve such needs. Commercial TV stations must make and retain in their files Children's Television Programming Reports (FCC Form 398) identifying the educational and informational programming for children aired by the station. (Noncommercial educational stations are not required to prepare these reports.) The report must include the name of the person at the station responsible for collecting comments on the station's compliance with the Children's Television Act. The station has to prepare these reports each calendar quarter, and it must place them in the public file separate from the file's other material. The licensee must keep these lists in the file until the next grant of the station renewal application has become final. You can also view each

station's reports on our website at <a href="http://www.fcc.gov/parents/localprograms.html">http://www.fcc.gov/parents/localprograms.html</a>.

**Records Regarding Children's Programming Commercial Limits.** As also discussed at page 17 of this Manual, the Children's Television Act of 1990 and our rules limit the type and amount of advertising that may be aired during TV programming directed to children 12 and under. Stations must keep records that substantiate compliance with this limitation in their public files and retain them until the next grant of the station renewal application has become final.

**Time Brokerage Agreements.** A time brokerage agreement is a type of contract that generally involves a station's sale of blocks of airtime to a third-party broker, who then supplies the programming to fill that time and sells the commercial spot announcements to support the programming. Commercial radio and television stations must keep in their public files a copy of every agreement involving: (1) time brokerage of that station, or (2) time brokerage by any other station owned by the same licensee. These agreements must be maintained in the file for as long as they are in force.

**Lists of Donors.** Noncommercial educational television and radio stations must keep in their public files a list of donors supporting each specific program. These lists must be retained for two years after the program at issue airs.

**Local Public Notice Announcements.** As discussed at pages 10-11 of this Manual, when someone files an application to build a new station or to renew, sell, or modify an existing station, we generally require the applicant to make a series of local announcements to inform the public of the application's existence and nature. These announcements are either published in a local newspaper or made over the air on the station, and are intended to give the public an opportunity to comment on the application. A statement certifying compliance with this requirement, including the dates and times that notice was given, must be placed in the public file. The only exception to this public notice requirement is when the proposed station sale is "pro forma" and will not result in a change of ultimate control, or the modification application does not contemplate a "major change" of the station facilities.

**Must-Carry or Retransmission Consent Election.** The public file for all commercial television stations must also contain documentation of the station's election for carriage over cable and satellite systems. In this regard, there are two ways that a broadcast TV station can choose to be carried over a cable or satellite system: "must-carry" or "retransmission consent." Each is discussed below.

Must-Carry. TV stations are generally entitled to be carried on cable television systems in their local markets. A station that chooses to exercise this right receives no compensation from the cable system. Satellite carriers may decide to offer local stations in a designated market area. If they choose to offer one station, then they must carry all the stations in that market that request carriage.

**Retransmission Consent.** Instead of exercising their "must-carry" rights,

commercial TV stations may choose to receive compensation from a cable system or satellite carrier in return for granting permission to the cable system or satellite carrier to carry the station. This option is available only to commercial TV stations. Because it is possible that a station that elects this option may not reach an agreement with the cable system, it may ultimately not be carried by the system.

Every three years, commercial TV stations must decide whether their relationship with each local cable system and satellite carrier that offers local service will be governed by must-carry or by retransmission consent agreements. Each commercial station must keep a copy of its decision in the public file for the three-year period to which it pertains.

Noncommercial stations are not entitled to compensation in return for carriage on a cable or satellite system, but they may request mandatory carriage on the system. A noncommercial station making such a request must keep a copy of the request in the public file for the duration of the period to which it applies.

**DTV Transition Consumer Education Activity Reports.** Each broadcast television station must place in its station public file on a quarterly basis an FCC Form 388 DTV Consumer Education Quarterly Activity Report outlining its efforts during the previous quarter to educate consumers on the transition to digital television. These reports must be maintained in the file for one year. Additional information about the DTV transition can be found at page 9 of this Manual.

### COMMENTS OR COMPLAINTS ABOUT A STATION

Comments to Stations and Networks. If you feel the need to do so, we encourage you to write directly to station management or to network officials to comment on their broadcast service. These are the people responsible for creating and selecting the station's programs and announcements and determining station operation. Letters to station and network officials keep them informed about audience needs and interests, as well as on public opinion on specific material and practices. Individuals and groups can often resolve problems with stations at the local level.

Comments/Complaints to the FCC. We give full consideration to the broadcast complaints, comments, and other inquiries that we receive. As stated above, we encourage you to first contact the station or network directly about programming and operating issues. If your concerns are not resolved in this manner, with the exception of complaints about obscene, indecent, or profane programming, which should be submitted in the manner described at page 15 of this Manual, and complaints about blanketing interference discussed at page 24, the best way to provide all the information the FCC needs to process your complaint about other broadcast matters is to complete fully the on-line complaint Form 2000E, which can be found at <a href="http://www.fcc.gov/cgb/complaints.html">http://www.fcc.gov/cgb/complaints.html</a>. You can also call in, e-mail or file your complaint in hard copy with the FCC's Consumer Center in the following manner:

If you are submitting an audio or video tape, DVD, CD or other type of media with your complaint, you should send it to the following address to avoid mail processing damage:

If you do not use the on-line complaint Form 2000E, your complaint, at a minimum, should indicate: (1) the call letters of the station; (2) the city and state in which the station is located; (3) the name, time, and date of the specific program or advertisement in question, if applicable; (4) the name of anyone contacted at the station, if applicable; and (5) a statement of the problem, as specific as possible, together with an audio or video tape, CD, DVD or other recording or transcript of the program or advertisement that is the subject of your complaint (if possible). Please include your name and address if you would like information on the final disposition of your complaint; you may request confidentiality. We prefer that you submit complaints in writing, although you may submit complaints that are time-sensitive by telephone, especially if they involve safety concerns. Please be aware that we can only act on allegations that a station has violated a provision of the Communications Act or the FCC's rules or policies.

In addition to (or instead of) filing a complaint, you can file a petition to deny or an informal objection to an application that a station licensee has filed, such as a license renewal application. This procedure is discussed at pages 10-11 of this Manual. You may obtain further information on the petition to deny process on the Commission's website, at
